## ANNE BEUS AND MOSES BYRNE

### Anne Beus

Anne Beus Byrne was born in Pramol, Piedmont, Italy, November 15, 1838. She was the daughter of Michael Beus and Marianne Combe Beus.

The Vaudois (pronounced vo-dwah'), of Waldense history was her history and her heritage. She was one with them and one of them. She was accustomed to trudging up and down the mountains with a large basket on her back filled with soil, wood or leaf mold. She was accustomed to the hunger, poverty and hardships which had been with her people for ages past. She sensed that their ways were hard and yet knew also that life could be hopeful and exciting.

Changes came rapidly in her life. A new religion, a new land in just a few short years. She knew what it involved to become a "Mormon" in those early days of the church. Home, friends, all that made life pleasant were gone, traded for scorn and ridicule.

She came to America in 1855 with her parents. They left Italy in November on sleds, then on rail to Paris and Glasis, then on to London on the steamer. On the twelfth of December 1855 they boarded the ship "John J. Boyd" for America. A more detailed account of their trials and travels is given in the history of Michael Beus, Anne's father.

Anne was a handcart girl and knew the same dry blistering heat and blowing sand as the others. She knew the beauty of a dazzling bright sky on a clear summer morning as she looked out across the plains. She also knew how that same sky could be taken over with great white clouds that would pile up like mountains, darken, and soon come at her with great rolls of thunder and jagged forks of lightning as the clouds tumbled past. She was seventeen years old, with hopes and dreams other than pulling a handcart. But pull one she did, either alone or helping someone else, over the long difficult miles. Her cracked, bare feet burned in the hot sand. When her father would send the children out to gather prickly pears to eat, their sore feet would get so full of thorns they found it difficult, almost impossible to continue walking. But when stomachs were empty, the problem of stickers in the feet was overlooked until after the evening meal, when they were able to relieve one another by removing the thorns from each other's feet. It was a real challenge at first for Ann to wade into the rougher streams and the larger streams like the Platte River, but she soon learned to hike up her skirts and wade into the worst of them along with the others.

As the handcart pioneers trudged across the treeless plains of Nebraska, Anne helped gather buffalo chips to feed the fires for cooking their meals. The carts were placed in a circle at night with their tents pitched in the center and guards stationed for protection.

The "Handcart Song" expresses the situation and feelings of the handcart people:

Ye Saints that dwell on Europe's shore  
Prepare yourselves with many more  
To leave behind your native land  
For sure God's Judgments are at hand.

Prepare to cross the stormy main  
Before you do the Valley gain,  
And with the faithful make a start  
To cross the plains with your handcart.

Some must push and some must pull  
As we go marching up the hill,  
As merrily on the way we go

Until we reach the valley, oh!

Anne found many changes in America that she was unaccustomed to in her native land. The wide expanse of the plains was so different from her closed-in mountain valleys in Italy. The snakes were terrifying, especially the rattlers. She had never seen a buffalo before. She had never heard the howl of a coyote nor witnessed an Indian with his painted body and tomahawk. All this was unusual and a bit unnerving. And yet each morning she picked up the bars of her cart and headed off through the sane or sage, to pull or push the cumbersome vehicle over the long distance and watch the miles fall steadily behind.

### The Handcart

A crude and lifeless thing of wood --  
 Two wheels, two shafts, and a box.  
 Yet it rolled the road to a Zion home  
 With never a mule or ox.  
 Propelled by blood of the human heart  
 The wood became a walking cart

Creeping thirteen-hundred miles  
 It squeaked and groaned and whined  
 Through dust, and rivers of mud and sweat,  
 Greased with a bacon rind.

When she reached the valley with the first handcart company Wilford Woodruff made these comments: "One of the most interesting scenes that was ever witnessed in our Territory was the arrival of two of the handcart companies September 26, 1856. . . I must say my feelings were inexpressible, to behold a company of men, women and children, many of them aged and infirm, enter the City of Great Salt Lake, drawing 100 handcarts . . . this sight filled our hearts with joy and thanksgiving to God." (Edmund Ellsworth Company)

Ann was a plucky young thing, friendly, sprightly and small, very dark complexioned and quick in her movements. Perhaps this was what Moses Byrne saw in her when she reached the Salt Lake Valley, for he married her a year later, December 10, 1857, as a second wife, in the President's Office in Salt Lake City.

Little is known of the first

years of her marriage. Moses contracted to cut hay for the Pony Express stations and while they were doing this they moved to where they could find wild hay to cut.

Her first child, a boy, David, was born in Slaterville, Utah, November 20, 1858, as was the second child, another boy, William, born November 10, 1860.

In 1861 Moses moved to Wyoming, leaving Anne in Utah and taking his first wife, Catherine Cardon, with him. Anne moved her family to Ogden where her father and mother lived. The families seemed to have kept rather close contact and histories indicate that when in Utah the Wyoming family stayed with "Aunt Anne."

Anne was left pretty much alone to care for her family. Moses made trips back to Utah and gave what aid he could but he was developing a new area and funds were scarce. Five more children were born -- three boys, James, Michael, and Lewis; two girls -- Anne and Martha.

The years in Ogden were difficult ones. As the children grew Anne taught them as she had been taught, to not be afraid to work, to be resourceful and independent and to be honest in all they did. She taught them to gather wool from the fences and brush after sheep had been in the area and then to clean, card and weave it for their gloves and heavy clothing. They gardened, tended their cattle and took care of their silk worms. They learned to work and be responsible when they were small, and William, the second boy, took a job herding his Grandfather Beus' cows when he was seven, which he did until he was fifteen years old. With effort and work from each one they managed to take care of themselves.

Just when Anne moved her family to Uintah I'm not certain but they acquired a farm and there built a log home, barns, and other sheds. Moses brought some cattle to them from Wyoming and through diligent effort they were able to provide for themselves. William went to Canada one summer and worked for Corey Brother's Construction Company laying the Union Pacific Railroad and made enough money to purchase a wagon and four mules to assist with the farming adventure.

William was married in 1885 and in 1887 moved to Idaho with his family. Sometime in 1889 James, then the oldest boy at home, took a horseback ride up through Wyoming and down through the Hoback country until he hit the Snake River, which he followed into Idaho. He thought some of settling in the Willow Creek area but was not successful in this effort and finally bought Dave and Boyd Wilcox's squatters rights at Sunnyside, Idaho. He returned to Uintah and made plans with his mother to move to Idaho.

The next spring they gathered everything they owned and on the evening of March 20, 1890, Anne set out once more to make a new life in a strange territory. She had lived in Utah about thirty-four years. No doubt it had become her home. Might we only know her thoughts and her dreams, this rugged little woman who had fought the elements many times in her life. She knew the cold of the Cottian Alps, she knew the warmth of the goats and sheep as she crept in among them at night when there was no warmth any place else. This had been the pattern of her youth -- bitter cold winds blowing unrelentingly through paper covered windows, too little to eat and insufficient clothing. And now she was leaving again, at age fifty two, to another toilsome and uncertain life.

They were driving a fairly large herd of cattle which Lew, the youngest son, drove the entire trip, the other boys taking care of the wagons. Just how they fared the first part of the journey is not certain, but we do know they camped in the Pocatello area when they got into Idaho. Also one night was spent in the Blackfoot region, one in Shelley and another in Idaho Falls. Somewhere in this area, just where we are not sure, Anne, with her son, Mike, and daughter, Anne, lagged behind and the others pushed on with the cattle. They camped with the cattle at the cedars west of LaBelle at the Edwards' place and then on to the Snake River, which they forded just south of the present W. D. Cook property. The animals were put in corrals made of large rope. When things had been made secure at the new location they returned for their mother.

Tremendous crops of hay and grain were raised and sold all over the valley. When the railroad was put in the area a siding just adjacent to their property was given the name of Byrne Siding, and is still known as such at the present time.

Before many years twelve and fourteen men were needed to help in the operation and Anne had to have extra help in the house to keep up with the many tasks it brought her. She worked long and hard gardening, planting lawns and shrubs, and her strawberries were as lovely as any around; all she could use and plenty left over for the grandchildren. They were never "shooed" away from her patch. Her produce was not gathered by the basketful, more than she could ever use. Much

was given away and nothing ever allowed to go to waste. Not even the hens had the pleasure of stealing their nests away if she could possibly find them and gather their eggs. This meant hunting around every hay stack, straw stack and shed. One day, as she climbed on top of an old building the timbers gave way and let her go through with straw and dirt and an apron full of eggs strewn all around her. Hard her life had been, to be sure, but this newly claimed land of hers had given her more than she had ever hoped for. Gone were the constant hunger pains of her youth, the never-ending torment and discrimination. Hers was a freedom now she had never dreamed possible.

Anne liked people and enjoyed having them come to her home. She learned the art of making home-made ice cream and cake, which she served to her company. This type of food was unheard of in her diet as a child, so it was a pleasure for her to acquire these new skills.

She was a gracious homemaker, and taught her children the courtesies necessary for them to grow into mannerly young people. She was friendly, yet quiet and cautious in her manner. She learned to understand English and to speak it rather brokenly. "Go stop (shut) the door." "Go pick (gather) the eggs." "Build (make) a cake." were some of her expressions. Not correct English, to be sure, but she was able to take care of herself successfully in her new language. She never trusted herself where money had to be handled, and when shopping, each item was selected and paid for singly as she decided on it, if it were no more than a spool of thread or a pair of shoe laces.

Anne was a tiny woman with long black hair and quick black eyes. When she brushed her hair she would sit on a chair and the ends of it would touch the floor. Beautiful, thick, shiny locks of hair, my grandmother told me, which she wore in two big braids on the back of her head, really quite striking, she said, on one so small.

Like all of us, she was not without fault, and sometimes her dark eyes would snap and her patience wear thin. "Damn the damn Danishmen, dead or alive." she would exclaim as a result of a dislike she had acquired for a certain group of them. But considering all, I have been told she was a most wonderful little woman. Her grandchildren loved her. "She was like the light from the brightest day." my father said. He tells of going to see her one time and, not being able to find her around the yard, he walked to the barn and there noticed a bunch of hay moving toward him from the small hay field beyond. He knew there had to be something under it even though there was no signs of it, so he waited until she reached the barn and emerged from beneath her load.

Her health began to fail and after considerable anguish and distress she passed on April 5, 1905, and was buried in the Sutton Cemetery at Archer, Idaho.

The following information was contributed by a grand daughter of Michael Byrne, Thelma Averett:

Anne had exceptionally tiny feet and as she walked across the plains she wore the flesh off her feet. She always had to wear an extra pair of woolen soles in her shoes, not only to make them fit, but to protect her feet, as they remained very tender the rest of her life. She was a very small person -- about 4 feet 10 inches tall. She was a very hard worker -- 400 acre farm, with the help of two sons. She killed rattlesnakes by picking them up and popping them like a man does a whip, thus popping their heads off. Always had a garden, no matter where she was. Baked her bread outside in dutch oven type pans in the ground. Brought a brass bucket across the plains -- used it for gathering eggs on the farm. Gave it to her grand daughter Alean Byrne, when she was 8 years old. This was done right after Anne's death. The bucket was kept by Alean B. Holl and until about 1975, when she gave it to her grandson, George Michael Averett.

## MOSES BYRNE

Moses Byrne was born in Northwich, Cheshire, England, January 2, 1820, the son of Denis (O'Byrne) Byrne and Jane Scarsbrick. Until he was sixteen years old he attended the government schools of England and the school of seamanship.

He joined the navy and followed the sea for about fifteen years, as nearly as I can learn. My grandfather, William Byrne, said he had been told that Moses had misrepresented his age when he joined the navy in order to be accepted, and the navy registers seem to bear this out. The Registers of Seamen at the Public Records Office, London shows "Moses Byrne, born Northwich, Cheshire - age 21 in 1839." By 1843 it shows "Moses Byrne, born Northwich, Cheshire - age 23 in 1843." He aged only two years in four years. According to this he was in the navy when he was nineteen. To know how much earlier will take more research.

Moses joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (Mormon) in 1853, and in 1854 left England for America, leaving a wife and children behind in England, for what reason I've never learned. He sailed from England, April 4, 1854, on the ship Germanicus, and crossed the plains in Captain Robert Campbell's company, arriving in Utah October 29, 1854.

Shortly after he arrived in Utah, six days in fact, he married Catherine Cardon on November 5, 1854. She was the daughter of Phillip Cardon and Martha Marie Tourn of Prarustin, Piedmont, Italy. According to emigration records Moses and the Cardons were in the same company as they crossed the plains. These records also indicate there was more than one Byrne in the company, as the record states "Byrne Brothers."

After he reached the valley, Moses worked for the Pony Express Stations as a contractor for grass hay. Their home base was Slaterville, Utah, but the procurement of hay necessitated moving to where grass was available, so they moved often, living in tents and occasionally a log house. Catherine cooked for ten men whom they employed in their work. He continued to cut hay for a period of ten years.

On December 10, 1859 Moses was sealed to Catherine Cardon and Anne Beus in the President's Office in Salt Lake City. Anne was also from Piedmont, Italy and was the daughter of Michael Beus and Marianne Combe. Anne came to Utah September 26, 1856 with the first handcart company that came into the valley, the Edmund Ellsworth Company.

Early in 1860 Moses Byrne took a contract from the Overland Stage Company from Denver, Colorado to build stage coach stations on the old emigrant trail through western Wyoming and part of Utah, and early in 1861, as nearly as I can tell, he and Catherine moved to Wyoming, leaving Anne in Utah.

Quoting now from Robert C. Byrne, a grandson of Moses Byrne: "These stations were built every fifteen miles, beginning at Point-of-Rocks, Wyoming and going westward into Utah. I don't know where the last one was built by him.

"He built one on the Muddy Creek, where he also built a toll-bridge which he managed for several years. This station was about fifteen miles west of Fort Bridger and where evidence still remains.

"He built the cabins mostly of logs, which he got from the forests many miles away. He would go to the timber and cut and fit the logs on the spot so that there would be no waste material to haul. He used mostly ox teams to haul with.

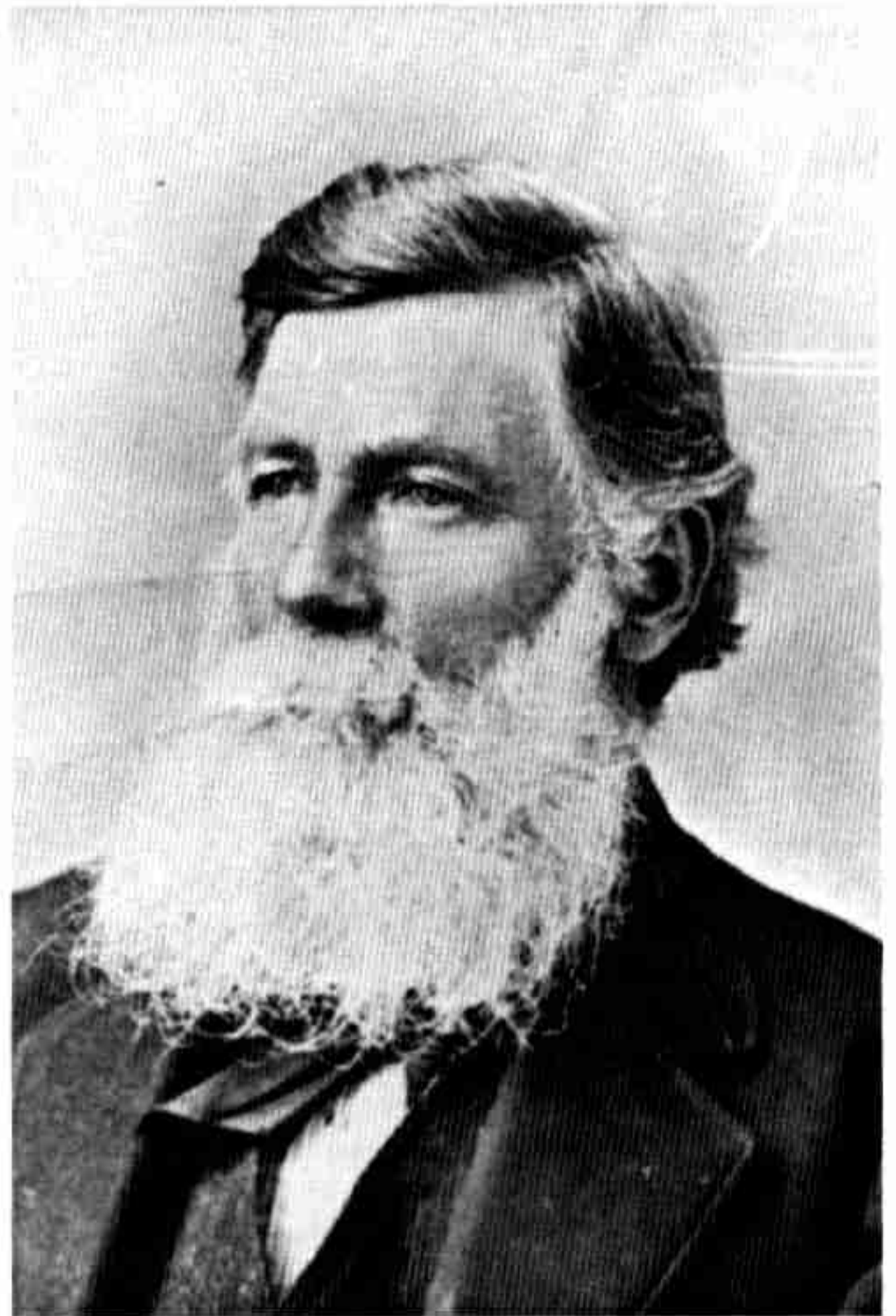
"He did considerable trading of horses, ox and supplies with the emigrants while he was at the toll bridge on the Muddy. He would often trade one strong, fat animal for two that were leg weary and played out.

He would also go to the natural meadows through the country and cut hay with scythes, and hand raking and piling it he would leave it there until winter, and then haul it to Fort Bridger, where he would sell it to the U. S. Government for use there at the fort.

"Just before the Union Pacific Railroad came through there by the station by the toll bridge my grandfather sent for Charles Guild and his wife to tend the station and bridge while he moved three miles farther up the Muddy, where he was building a store and had contracted some work on the railroad grade and to furnish ties from the Piedmont woods. He started a town here when he built the store, and named it Byrne. This name was changed, however, by request of the Union Pacific Railroad, because of confusion with the town of Bryan farther east on the railroad. The new name was Piedmont, named in honor of the country in Italy where my grandmother, Mrs. Moses Byrne and her sister Mrs. Charles Guild came from."

Piedmont was essentially in Shoshone territory, but there were only two instances of serious Indian trouble. The first occurred while Moses Byrne was still running the Muddy Creek Stage Station. A small hunting party of Sioux rode by and kidnapped Byrne's two-year-old son Eddie, while he was playing in the yard. The Indians moved swiftly and by the time the child was missed all chances of rescue were gone. Heartbroken, the Byrnes gave up all hope of ever seeing their son again. One summer day two years later, Chief Washakie rode into the station and handed the stunned Moses his now four-year-old boy. The chief would not tell where he had gotten the child. Eddie Byrne grew up to become mayor of an Idaho town, where he was buried.

The second event occurred one evening at Charles Guild's ranch. Sixteen of Washakie's braves broke into the house while Charles was away and threatened to burn the house if Mrs. Guild didn't give them firewater. While under the pretense of searching for whiskey (she had none in the

house) Mrs. Guild managed to sneak her seven-year-old son James out of the house. James rode to the Moses Byrne ranch about a mile and a quarter east of Piedmont, and Byrne, rallying some other men, returned with James and ran the Indians off. Washakie, upon hearing rumors of the raid, promptly came to Mrs. Guild and demanded to know the names of the braves who had frightened her. Although she knew most of them through business dealings with them in her husband's store, she refused to tell Washakie because she knew his punishment of them would be severe. After her refusal, Washakie had his squaw make a beaded purse for Mrs. Guild and a pair of moccasins for Mr. Guild, as a token of his good will.

On March 31, 1871 Moses and Catherine were excommunicated from the church, for just what reason I am not sure. Moses told his son William, my grandfather, he had broken his leg and was unable to pay tithing, and for this he was excommunicated. I told grandfather I doubted this, but in 1976 when I visited the archives in Salt Lake City about having his blessings restored I was told that at about that time some excommunications took place for rather insignificant reasons (some because the bishop didn't approve of the store a person shopped at) and Moses and Catherine may have been in such a situation, but I never learned the reason for certain. Maybe the broken leg was the cause. Moses was baptized 19 March 1976, since the date of July 21, 1901 which has been given for his return to the church could not be verified. I had a copy of the Temple Index Bureau card giving this as his baptism date, but it could not be found in Salt Lake, so the work had to be re-done. The endowment he received in life, together with all sealings and blessings which were received in this life were restored.

The contract Moses made with the U. P. Railroad proved to be a very profitable business. The procuring of the ties and piles was quite an operation. The men would go into the groves and cut in the winter and then haul the timbers in the spring and summer into Piedmont with ox teams. There they would load them on the railroad cars. Later he brought the poles down on Muddy Creek, which later became known as the "Tie Drive." He also engaged in the manufacture of charcoal and the burning of lime in large kilns, in the transportation of which he utilized over fifty teams. The magnitude of this operation and the necessity of the community and his employees caused him to open a mercantile establishment. This business he successfully operated for years, and his son Francis took charge of it when Moses retired. He had several ranches and a herd of cattle and horses in the Piedmont area.

The small community of Piedmont grew up around the care and operation of the kilns and the task of bringing the poles down on the Tie Drive. Homes were built to accommodate the people employed in these activities, along with a school to educate the children.



Simon Bamberger was hide buyer for a hide and fur establishment in St. Louis and he bought many hides in the Piedmont area. One winter the snows became very deep and weather was very cold and it became impossible to get his hides into Piedmont to ship them out on the railroad, so he remained through the winter in the valley and stayed at the Byrne home. We are told that during this winter he made the suggestion to Moses that they build the charcoal kilns. This suggestion was put into action and became a thriving business with the charcoal product being shipped to the smelters in Utah. The business remained very profitable until the Union Pacific Railroad completed the Aspen Tunnel and then the profits dwindled, people moved away and the once-busy community eventually became a ghost town.

And the grasses and the flowers withered and the  
herds and villages melted away --  
In time the wound healed, but a scar was left.

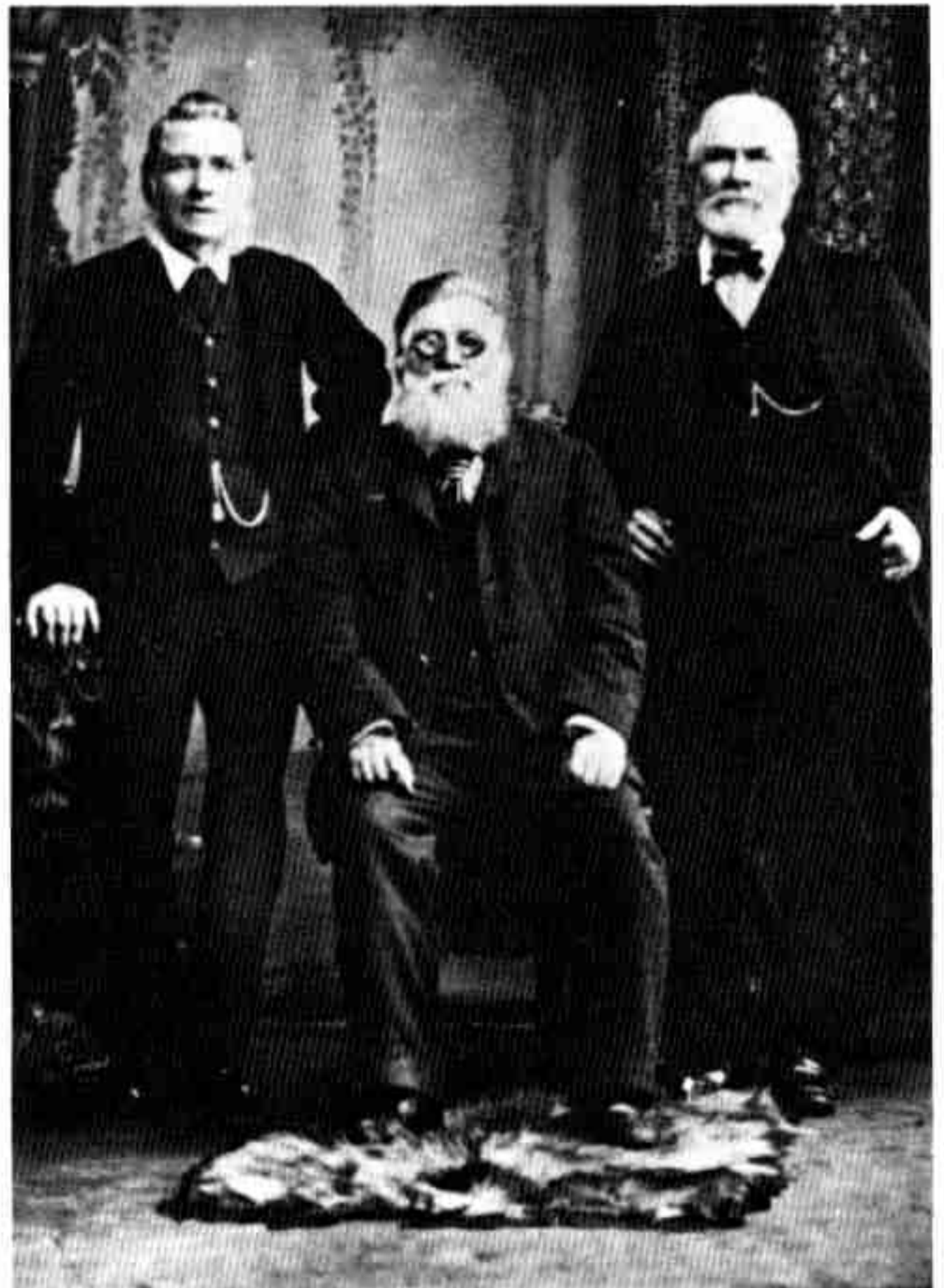

He made a trip back to England to visit his brothers who were still living in Liverpool. In later years cataracts developed on his eyes and caused considerable damage. During all these years his wife Ann was living in Utah. When Moses left for Wyoming she moved from Slaterville to Ogden, where she lived in a small home by her father and mother. He made numerous visits back to Utah, but didn't come back permanently. Ann had five children after 1861 when Moses and Catherine left, and sometimes had a struggle taking care of them. Can you imagine bearing and caring for these babies with your husband living in Wyoming all the time?

Moses and Catherine moved back to Utah in August 1886 and returned to Piedmont in 1893. While in Utah they built a frame house on Uintah Bench, and lived with Ann for a few months while the home was being built. During that time (1890) Ann moved with her family to Idaho where her son Will was living. Catherine died November 15, 1902, and once more Moses returned to Utah, but he returned to Piedmont in 1903 to live with his daughter, Alice, who was a widow. Moses died March 22, 1904, age 84, at Piedmont, and was buried there. His services were held in the Piedmont school house March 24, 1904 with Bishop Brown officiating.

He had been a very industrious, energetic man who came to America with very little of this world's material things. My grandmother, Maria Byrne, Moses' daughter-in-law, who knew him well, described him as a very pleasant, jovial person; witty, quick of movement and always ready to sing or whistle the tunes of the sea. Somewhat impulsive, he sometimes did and said things for which he was later sorry.

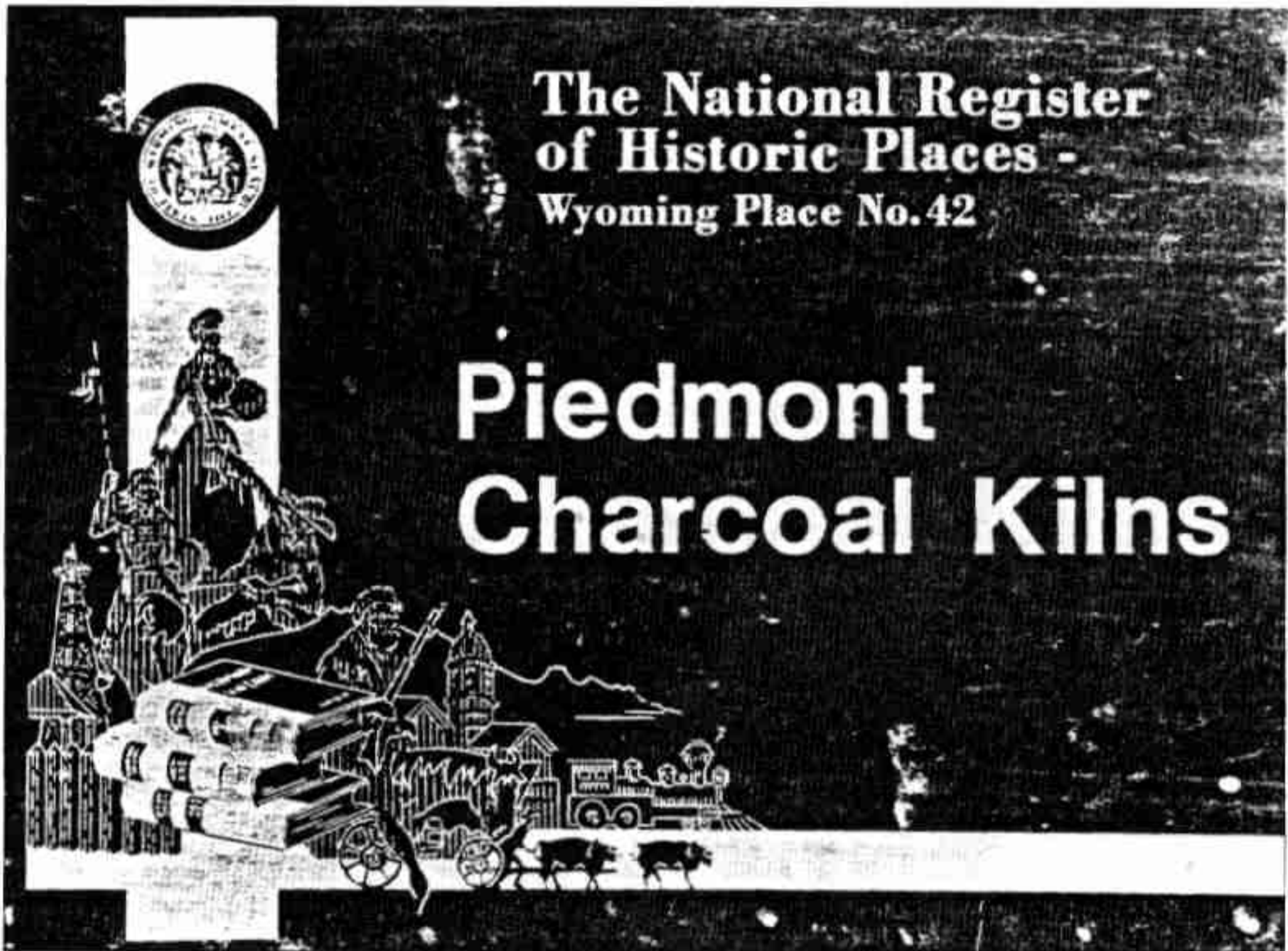
The following is taken from a sketch of Moses Byrne published in the book "Progressive Men of the State of Wyoming" (A. W. Bowen & Co. 1903):

"During the forty years of his residence in Wyoming Mr. Byrne has steadily and without exception, maintained the character of a worthy, reliable and honest citizen. For years his counsel upon all questions of public interest had been that of the Democratic Party, and in its cause he has labored earnestly and well. Fraternally, he is identified with that Ancient Order, the Honored Brotherhood of Free and Accepted Masons, with which he became affiliated in England, the place where he is still maintaining his membership.

"His life during the whole of his long residence here has been one of activity, not only in his own interests but in those pertaining to the public as well. He is a representative of that energetic class of men who have made the western portion of the United States famous on account of their enterprises and determination with which they they have undertaken and pushed to completion plans for betterment of their own and their children's material condition and also the business and moral interests of the communities where they have resided. None of the present generation has a higher place in the esteem and love of the people, than the honorable and venerable Moses Byrne."



Only the hardest and the self-sufficient could survive the severe winters and the isolation of the Wyoming area. Living was dangerous not only because of the elements but because of the cattle rustling gangs and vigilante groups. No one was safe from the wrath of these mean ruthless groups. Moses and many others instrumental in conquering this harsh, rugged region, to me are described in this verse by Edgar A. Guest:

Born for a little while to blaze  
 In action in the heat of strife,  
 And then to shrivel with Time's blast  
 And fade forever in the past.

## Another Vanished Race

"[Charcoal] kilns built a century ago stand at Piedmont Wyoming, Pioche and Ely, Nevada, and Nicholia, Idaho.

"With their Roman style ground level doors, and high-placed backside loading windows they're as uniform in size as ten-penny nails. Unmortared keystones lock the stone casings of the openings.

"A square of masonry isn't so difficult, but the kilns are conical. And they had to be fitted with a system of vents around the bottom so that the charcoal makers could control the internal firings. Otherwise the wood stacked in them simply burned up, leaving no charcoal for the smelting of ores.

"...Take the four kilns at Piedmont built in 1869 by Moses Byrne, grandfather of Mrs. Mamie Byrne sharp, Fort Bridger, Wyoming, for the smelters of Utah Valley. He had to work with a mixture of sandstone, limestone and redstone. The chemical reaction of mortars is different with each.

One of the kilns he built collapsed, so many years ago the sagebrush has grown high in its dirt foundation. It was the northern-most kiln, the one he built first. By the time he got to the second one he had gotten the "scald" (the right combinations) for the remaining three are solid.

By the time the Piedmont kilns went out of business -- the town of Piedmont dissolved in 1908 when the Union Pacific Railroad shortened its route between Green River and Evanston by tunneling through Aspen mountain -- the man in charge of firing them had it comparatively easy. He had factory-made bricks from Salt Lake City for plugging the vents.

That the product of kiln artists should be preserved is being recognized with increasing acuteness.

The six at Ely, Nevada have been embraced by the Nevada State park System. The three and remnant at Piedmont, Wyoming have been fenced by the state's Historical Landmark Commission. Effort is being made to protect the four of green stone at Pioche, Nevada. Idaho's are so remote from public travel that no protection has been assigned.

The sad part is that kiln builders -- most of them came from Italy where masonry abounds -- didn't sign their output, unlike either the paper people or even the late-coming concrete sidewalk pourers.

To whom credit should go has, in most cases, been lost.

The manufacture of the charcoal in these huge stone kilns was a time consuming task. The wood had to be placed in the kilns and the intake of air controlled so as to not allow the wood to burn too rapidly. The fire needed to smolder so a charring effect would result. If complete combustion was allowed the moisture from the wood would vaporize rapidly and all would be consumed. By controlling the air intake through the small vents around the base of the kiln, the heat would permeate the stack of wood partially consuming it, but leaving the charcoal, a black, brittle, odorless material, which burns without smoke or flame.

## WILLIAM BYRNE AND MARIA TERRY

William Byrne, the son of Moses Byrne and Anne Beus Byrne, was born November 10, 1860 at Slaterville, Weber County, Utah, the second child in a family of seven. The other children are as follows: David, born October 20, 1858; James, born March 11, 1862; Michael, born November 23, 1863; Anne, born April 18, 1871; Louis, born August 8, 1874; Martha, born April 13, 1876.

Sometime in 1861, Moses took his wife, Catherine, and their family and moved to Piedmont, Wyoming. Anne and her family (plural wives) moved from Slaterville, Utah to Ogden, where she lived in a small home by her father. This left them pretty much on their own except for occasional visits from their father, and providing for the family was sometimes a real problem. Because of this situation William became loaded with responsibility early in life and sensed the need of helping to provide for the family. His grandfather, Michael Beus, gave him the job of herding cows for fifteen dollars a month. This task he did faithfully from the time he was seven years old until he was fifteen. With the help of the children, guidance and help from their grandfather and a bit of assistance from their father, they succeeded in providing a living. As the boys grew older they purchased a piece of land at Uintah, Utah. Here they built a house and barn of logs, farmed their newly acquired land and became self-sustaining. Except for a few visits to Wyoming where he worked for his father "snaking" trees from the aspen groves for railroad ties he spent most of his young adult life with his mother helping and assisting her on their small farm.

In the spring of 1883 William ("Will", as he was called) went to Canada to work for Corey Brother's Construction Company on the railroad. He worked there all summer and when he returned to Uintah in the fall he was driving a brand new wagon and four head of mules for use on the farm. As he drove down main street in the small town of Uintah he noticed a young girl walking along the road and liked what he saw.

"I liked her appearance," he said, "her bearing and her manner and really took a fancy to her."

Her name was Maria, and as she stood on the street that lovely fall day, she watched the shiny, new, buck-board wagon, drawn by four high-stepping mules, coming toward her. They were moving at a pretty good clip and dust rolled up around them catching everyone's attention. But the thing that attracted Maria was not so much the outfit, but the driver, a black-haired young man



sitting tall and proud on the spring seat, fully aware of the excitement he was causing and enjoying every moment of it. Quickly she decided she didn't like him.

"Arrogant, conceited, young buck," she concluded, and with that never gave him another thought. She wasn't aware Will had taken any particular notice of her, but before many days had passed he stood at her door step, his black hair combed and neat, his piercing blue eyes challenging.

"She made courting real rough for awhile," he said.

"But you were so sure you were going to get me," she chided him back, her blue eyes twinkling. "I had formed an opinion and wasn't going to give it up so easily."

Something in his bearing and personality made her change this hurriedly drawn conclusion, however, and before long they were keeping steady company. They were married February 14, 1885, just a little more than a month before her seventeenth birthday. They chose Valentines Day for their wedding day so there must have been a little of the romantic in them. Maria found him to be neither conceited nor arrogant, but very considerate and helpful, never missing a morning of preparing the cereal for breakfast and leaving it on the stove to simmer while he went to chore. This he did before anyone else stirred from their beds.

The girl who had impressed him so that fall day in 1883 was Maria Terry, the daughter of Joel Terry and Roemma Garner Terry. She was born in Farmington, Davis County, Utah, March 27, 1868.

Will and Maria lived in Uintah the first couple of years after they were married and their first son, Ortez, was born there November 23, 1885. In early 1887 Will and his friend, John Summers, began talking about moving to Idaho. They had heard good things about southeastern Idaho and the Snake River Valley and decided to take a look for themselves. They saddled their horses and headed north. Before they returned home John had secured a piece of ground and there was another just east of John's that Will hoped he might be able to get. The property was located in the small area of Burton.

After discussing and planning they packed wives, babies and all into their wagons and rolled out of Uintah on the seventh of October 1887 with everything they owned. Maria said "We started out undaunted, another home to find."

They were driving eight head of cows, which John drove, riding a horse the entire trip. Will and Maria had two span of horses pulling their wagon so the heavy pieces of furniture and equipment were loaded on their wagon

and the light material was put on John's, making it more easily managed by the women. The weather was very pleasant, with no storms during their travels. Each night they made their beds on the ground and cooked their meals on a brush wood fire. The first Sunday they stopped at Malad, Idaho to rest. The last day or two of their trip a cold wind started to blow, so they were glad the distance was getting less.

The south bank of the Snake River was reached on October 22nd. The men each took a horse and started out to find a good place to ford the stream, as there was no bridge or ferry on the Snake River for miles. It was early morning when they left camp and when they hadn't returned at evening time the young women became worried and frightened. Maria said she was fearful they were going to have to sit the night out alone on the river bank. But as darkness settled in the men returned. The next morning they forded the river and started toward Burton. Just where they crossed is not certain, but it was somewhere between the Lorenzo area and the confluence of the North and South Forks of the Snake River. They had been traveling for sixteen days and were reaching the end of their destination. About sunset they reached John's farm on the Texas Slough. It was October the 23rd, 1887. They were so pleased to see a cabin. Babies were getting weary and cross and they were grateful that their journey was over and that they had made it without any trouble.



The two-room log cabin they planned to sleep in that night was a keen disappointment to them. The windows had been removed and cattle had broken down the doors, so they slept on the ground as they had done the many nights before. Next morning they cleaned cabin and hung quilts at the doors and windows until they could get to Rexburg to obtain supplies. Each family took a room for their own and in this way they managed for about a month, when Will traded a team of horses, harnesses and a cow to Al Brown (Brown held a "squatters" right on the property) for 160 acres of ground on which was a one-room cabin with a dirt floor and dirt roof. The dirt floor soon became a floor of new, pine boards and new windows were hung with curtains and the log cabin became a home. This property was along the north side of the Texas Slough, where it makes a big bend to its most northerly point and their little cabin was on the north side of the wagon trail that followed the north bank of the slough. They were just east of the Summer's farm as they had hoped to be.

They needed wheat for flour that winter so Will traded a real fine cattle dog they brought from Utah to John A. Garner for wheat and in this way provided themselves with flour.

The two families were very close and did everything together. The men worked together getting

out fence posts and wood until the first snow came in January, when they could no longer use their wagons. With the snow came problems of cold, wet feet and legs so they wrapped themselves in gunny sacks to help keep warm and dry.

Spring came and so did the flies! They were everywhere, and so thick one could hardly eat or drink because of them. Everything had to be covered, but it was impossible to keep them out of the food. Finally screens were obtained for the windows and the fly problem was controlled somewhat. Then came the mosquitoes! Terrible little beasts they were. Little one, big ones, and they came in swarms, buzzing and biting everyone in sight. The screens were useless against them, and the women and children had to stay indoors with the doors and windows closed. Mrs. Summers said it seemed they just pushed one another through the screens. A pan smudge was kept going and the kiddies were rubbed with kerosene to try and keep the mosquitoes away. The trick of sewing mosquito net on their straw hats was soon learned and everyone had a mosquito hat.

Each family worked from daylight until dark, milking the cows at 11 o'clock at night and again at four o'clock in the morning. They tried to have a smudge fire ready in the corral for the cows when they turned them from the pasture and the animals would come home on the run to get into the smoke away from the mosquitoes. A small plot of ground was fenced for a garden and soon a fine garden was growing, but the ditch went dry in July and water had to be carried from the slough to save the vegetables. Soon the rabbits ate the peas off, but they came again and they had a pea crop. Maria said they never put a seed in the ground that did not grow. Weeds were never a problem for many years and then a few pig weeds started to grow and they used them for greens in the spring.

The first summer both Will and John worked for John A. Garner and their evenings were spent pulling sagebrush on their own land until the horses gave out and then they would set fire to the huge piles of brush. In many places the sage grew taller than the horses and a man and his team could be busy at work and no one would realize they were there. Often times they would lose the cows in this sagebrush forest.

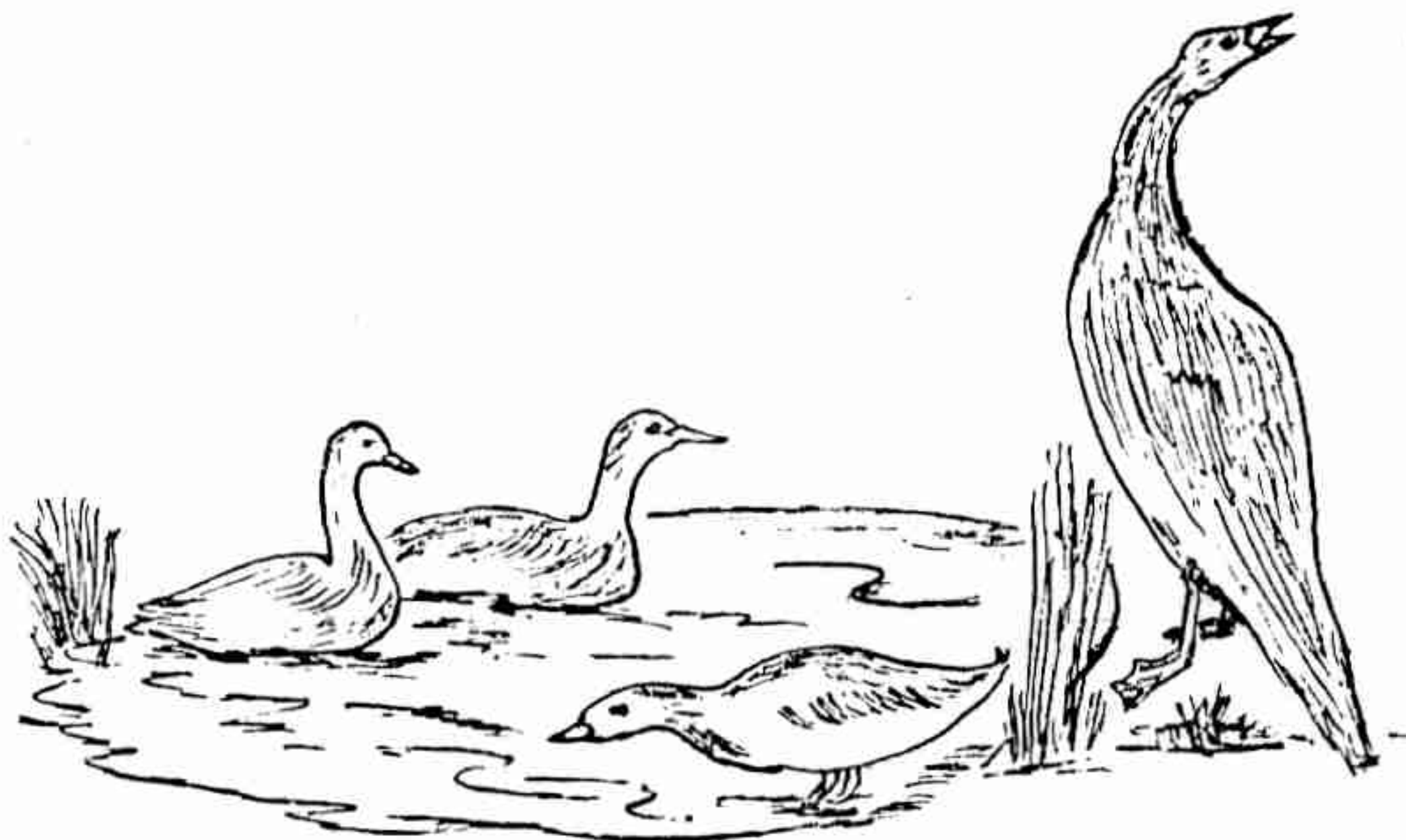
Maria and her friend, Mary, spent many hours

together, helping each other and trading work and ideas back and forth. Neither had a "best" dress, so they decided to save their pennies and dimes and finally, by pooling their meager savings they were able to get the new dress, which they took turns wearing.

Will's horses were a very important part of his life. He worked with them everyday and could handle them without a bridle of any kind. Driving them "without a line," he called it. He would call "Gee" for his horse to go right and "Ha" when he wished him to go left. He did all his cultivating with a horse he called "Bally" and never used a line. The first plow he used with this horse was a wooden beam hand plow. He loved to train and groom his horses and took pride in

their appearance. They were trained to know their exact position when being hitched to a plow or wagon and never had to be led into their place.

About a year after Will and John and their families came to Burton a family by the name of Hill moved into the area. Robert Hill and his wife settled on a piece of property just south and a little east of Will's place. It was located on the south side of the road and Mrs. Hill said she would not live in a house that faced to the north and that was just what she would have had if they built on their ground, so Mr. Hill came to Will and asked if he would sell him an acre of ground so he could build a log house that would face south as his wife wished. Will had a triangle-shaped piece of land where the canal came into his property so he sold an acre to Hills so Mrs. Hill could be happy in her new situation. The corrals and sheds were built across the street to the south, but Mrs. Hill carried on her womanly tasks in her domain to the north.



Some years later a son of Robert's, Daniel G. Hill, was killed in an automobile wreck. He left a wife, Mary Gunnel Hill and two children, Danny and Ester. Some time later Will was preparing to go to bed. As usual Maria was still in the kitchen as she was never one to retire at regular bedtime hours. Will sat down on a chair at the side of the bed to unlace his shoes. As he finished one shoe and was in the process of pulling it from his foot he became aware of a figure standing in the room. On looking up he saw that it was Daniel G. Hill. For just a moment he stood there and his appearance so startled Will that he dropped his shoe to the floor. The noise shattered the silence and immediately the figure vanished, leaving Will shaken, amazed and wondering what Dan desired of him - or had perhaps wanted to tell him.

An elderly gentleman (no one knew his name, so he was called "The Old Peddler" by everyone) rode the area on his horse selling articles and notions to whomever would buy. He carried pots and pans, tobacco, coffee, needles and thread and other small items with him tied to his horse. One day in early spring when the waters of the Texas Slough were high some of the people to the south of the slough were in need of coffee and other items and the only way to acquire them was for "The Old Peddler" to try to cross the lake-like water of the slough. He came to Will and John and asked that they help him prepare to go. He was a crippled fellow and so was unable to swim and he desired that they tie him to his horse as he felt sure the horse would be able to swim across. This they did and he urged his horse into the current. Luck was not with him that day however, and as the horse swam out into the rapidly moving water he floundered and went under. The horse surfaced again little farther down stream and John and Will thought maybe they would make it, but suddenly they were caught in a mass of swirling water and were pulled under again. They struggled and fought for a bit more, but the horse soon gave out and went down, carrying them both to a

tragic death.

Will and John were able to pull the horse from the water and secure the body. The county seat was in Blackfoot, Idaho, sixty miles away and they tried to make contact with someone there to determine what to do about a burial. Communication was slow and they received no answer to their inquiry. They prepared the body for burial as best they could and laid it out in Will's log granary, which was a fairly cool building. A few days passed and no word came from Blackfoot and the condition of the body became bad. Maria finally took over and said the odor was becoming so offensive something had to be done. Will and John prepared a wooden coffin and the body was taken to the Burton cemetery for burial. They had no idea just where to put the grave, but they finally selected a spot, dug the grave and completed the burial, only to find out later the spot was out of line with the other graves and the road had to be built with a crook in it to go around his grave. So the "Old Peddler" was laid to rest in an unclaimed spot by two who could not even give him a name.

The years passed. Babies were born, another boy and three girls. Clarence Coral (Carl), born February 21, 1890; Stella Mae, October 9, 1893; Cecel Ora, July 9, 1898; Edna Elnora, May 14, 1905.

Living was hard for them, but as Maria said, it was the only life they knew -- everyone was living pretty much the same and trying to improve their condition by pioneering new areas and learning to cope with the hardships and problems as they came.

Maria was a hard worker and soon went about planting bushes, gardens and trees. As soon as water was sufficient they planted raspberries, strawberries, currants, gooseberries and apple and plum trees to help with their food problems.

Money and food were scarce and everything they grew became very important. Pig weeds and dandelions were used for greens, weeds they couldn't eat were pulled and fed to a pig so they could have meat. Vegetables such as string beans and beets were allowed to grow larger than usual to make greater quantities, thus supplying more food, and even after they acquired more Maria never "out grew" this habit, and she always made use of all the weeds for pig feed and string beans were still allowed to grow too large at times.

In the summer of 1896 the William Beattie family lived a mile east of the Byrne ranch. Mr. Beattie took a job working in Yellowstone Park, more than one hundred miles north and east of Burton. During his absence his eldest daughter, Hattie, became seriously ill. His daughter, Leone, tells how Will came to the Beattie home and asked what he could do to help. He was told that

somehow they must get word of the illness to Mr. Beattie in the Park. Will told them he would go, so they brought a pony belonging to Silas Beattie for Will to make the trip on. Hurriedly, he prepared the necessities, climbed on his pony and started on his hundred mile ride. I don't know how long the ride took, but he reached his destination and Mr. Beattie got on the pony and headed back to Burton, while Will stayed and took over his job. The return trip was made but the girl had passed away before her father reached home. Not only did the girl lose her life, but the gallant little pony dropped to the ground when they reached the Beattie corrals and they were never able to revive him.

Will used to tell of a conversation he had with his father-in-law, Joel Terry, about the kinds of women he had observed in his life. Joel said as nearly as he could tell women could be grouped into three kinds - (1) the pitch-patch woman; (2) the tie-up woman; (3) the tear-off woman. He said the "pitch-patch" woman would always pitch into any task needing done and be willing to work things through, patching clothes and socks, mending and making most of unpleasant conditions whenever necessary. The "tie-up" woman was not nearly so efficient. She would hurriedly pull together an offending tear, half do whatever had to be done and be careless in taking care of things. The "tear-off" gal didn't take care of anything, nor was she ever concerned about saving or trying to keep things in any kind of order. A tear was never mended, but allowed to worsen until the article was ruined. She was known to rip off the torn portion and use it as long as possible and then discard it. Mending was unheard of in her hurry-scurry life. Not a very sophisticated description of women, to be sure, but strong indication that he had done some pretty close observing in his life and Will was both impressed and agreeable with his observations.

Life for these hard working pioneers was always busy, but they often had their fun and their laughs as they worked in the fields and homes together. Prank pulling was a common source of pleasure and Will was as good at pulling pranks as the others. They would undo the tugs on each others outfits or unfasten the hame straps or loosen the check rains, sometimes causing general havoc with someone's ability to drive his horses.

One day a group of men were

working on a ditch with hand plows and, unnoticed, Will managed to mix up the driving reins on A. M. Carter's string of horses. When Mr. Carter called for his horses to go, he had horses pulling and struggling to go in every which direction, pulling the plow out of the ground and causing the driver all kinds of confusion. When he managed to get his horses calmed down he yelled out,

"Will Byrne, where are you? If I'm not mistaken this is more of your tomfoolery."

They all had their laugh and then gathered around to get the horses and reins straightened out and ready to move again.

One day when Will was out fixing barb-wire fence he ripped a nasty gash in the big finger on his right hand. The cut didn't heal and was soon red and swollen with blood poisoning. It gave him lots of pain and distress and finally a doctor operated on it, just why I'm not sure. A tendon was severed during the surgery and he was left with a completely stiff finger that gave him considerable trouble all his life. It was so awkward for him to work with and was very difficult to keep warm in the winter cold.

Will served as a school board trustee for the Burton School District for several years and was also a member of the Texas Irrigation Company Board and did much to help build the canals to furnish water for the farms. The construction of these huge arteries took the best that man and beast could muster. Teams would pull hand plows through the hard ground with a man bucking the handlebars and trying to keep the plow in the ground. After the soil was loosened, tongue scrapers were pulled in to move the soil away so the hand plows could come back through and plow a little deeper. This procedure was repeated over and over and by this slow method these great water channels were made to cross the fields carrying the precious, life-giving water to the thirsty soil. Finally, after supreme effort and many hours of exhausting toil and work, green fields of waving grain stood where once huge sages had made the soil very high worthless.

In the fall of the year when the grain had ripened and was ready for harvest the binders would pull into the fields and cut the grain down, laying it in golden rows across the fields. After it had been shocked (stacked compactly together upright in the field) the men and wagons would go into the fields, gather the bundles and haul them to the threshers. The old horse-powered threshers were far different than what we are accustomed to. Eight head of horses were "hitched" to a large "tumbling rod", then a driver would drive the horses around in a circle, thus turning the machinery and threshing out the grain. Boys, called "band cutters", were used to cut the twine on the bundles of grain and throw them into the conveyor chains, which carried them into the thresher. It was a slow process, but they managed to get the job done. The grain was then taken to Market Lake (now Roberts, Idaho) to be sold. The wagons would have to ford the Snake River to get there and then their grain would bring 35 cents a bushel.

They raised hay, grain and sugar beets on their 160 acres after the sagebrush was cleared away and the canal was put through. Huge crops of hay were stacked in the hay yards and always a stack of golden grain straw stood in the yard ready for winter feed and bedding for the cattle. Haying time was always an interesting activity, when loads of hay came into the yards to be unloaded. The hay derrick, with its high boom pole could be dangerous as well as fascinating. The man on the hay stack had to watch out for it as it swung around with the jackson fork full of hay to be unloaded or he might get bumped off the stack onto the ground below. When William's son, Carl, was just a lad he was usually given the job of working of the stack and he became very apt at knowing how to handle it and just where to have the fork full of hay dropped. There was always the danger of getting too heavy a load on the jackson fork and having a boom pole break under the weight. This did on occasion happen and if the pole happened to strike the man on the stack it could be devastating. Carl's friend, Ralph Barney, was stacking one day in the Byrne hay yard when the pole broke, striking him on the head. It gashed his head terribly and broke both jaws as well as other bumps and bruises.

The one-room log cabin became a two-room cabin and later a new frame home was built a little farther east of the cabin, with a big screen porch across the front to protect them from flies and mosquitoes. The ice house was built at the back of the house and filled with huge chunks of ice cut from the Texas Slough, then sawdust was dumped over the ice to insure them ice for the next summer. Meat and other perishable items were stored in the ice to help prevent spoilage. Close by Will built their smoke house and this was used for curing and smoking meat. Before too many years slipped away trees, flowers and lawns replaced the sagebrush. Apple trees, currants, plums and berries provided all the fruit they could use. They worked hard, life was harsh and difficult at times, but they were rewarded with many comforts too. A new piano was placed in the carpeted front room, along with the large leather davenport and chairs. The new cream colored carpet with its bouquets of lovely pink roses, new tables, a most modern phonograph and delightful lace curtains made a parlor that seemed like paradise for Will and Maria after their experiences with log cabins, leaky dirt roofs and dirt floors.

And then one day Will decided to have a new car, so he built a new garage along the west side of their home and purchased a new "Reo." He was very proud of his new car, but learning to drive

it was quite a challenge. So many years of handling horses made the clutching and breaking of a car a difficult task. One day he took the "Reo" out for a practice drive. Everything went pretty well until he came back into his own yard. He turned into the driveway and decided to drive it right into the garage, but as he pulled into the building he forgot the break and the clutch and the gas lever.

"Whoa, Whoa," he called, but the car paid him little attention. Before he gathered his wits and remembered what he should do a good portion of the back wall of the garage had splintered and crashed in around him.

Maria was never without her laying hens and flock of geese and ducks. Goose picking time was never the most enjoyable time as the huge birds would struggle and protest against having their feathers plucked from them. Flapping wings, squawk and most certainly some badly pecked hands were nearly always a part of the normal performance staged by each goose. Once a year this ordeal was repeated, whether to the liking of the geese or not.

And so it was with these mundane things that Will and Maria filled their days. They worked long and hard to take care of the farm and the things they had gathered around them. It was no small task for Maria to manage the extra cooking that had to be done at haying and threshing time. Sometimes the neighbor ladies would help each other as the crews moved from farm to farm. Along with all the activities on the farm the cattle had to be taken to the mountains for summer pasture and the task of going after them at round-up time in the fall was sometimes a dangerous and tedious undertaking.

One day Harver Summer's dog "Spot" had to be shot because he had rabies. The dog had been with Will's dog and Harvey came to tell him what had happened. They tied the dog up and decided to watch it for any sign of the disease. Sometime passed and it showed no symptoms so they considered turning it loose. The knot in the rope around the dog's neck had pulled tight and Will had trouble getting it untied, so he removed his gloves to make the untying easier. As he reached toward the rope, the dog became ferocious, growling and snarling and buried his teeth in Will's wrist. As will backed away the dog went wild, stripping the bark from the tree with his teeth and claws and tearing a feather mattress that was used as his bed to shreds.

The doctor made a search for serum and the closest was in New York. It would take twelve days to get the serum, so the long wait began -- one day, two days and then three. The uncertainty and suspense were terrible. How long might it be before the dread disease became apparent in Will? He went the full twelve days with no apparent reaction and when the serum arrived his series of shots began. He never reacted to any of them. The day of his last shot he drove to town alone. Maria told him he should have someone with him, but he felt confident he would be fine. After getting his shot he headed home, but part way the shot reacted so violently he was unable to control himself and he very quickly became unconscious. The car ran into the gutter and rolled over and there he was found. After several rough days he fought off the effects of the serum and made a complete recovery, but it had been a terrifying experience for them.

The Terry family (Maria's father and mother) had lost four children - three of them little girls - in 1879 when diphtheria took so many lives in Utah. Maria was only eleven years old at the time and when, five years later, another little girl was born she became a real joy for Maria. This little girl was named Alice, and when very young became violently ill. At one time during the illness their father feared she had passed away and in his great concern and anxiety administered to the child and pleaded with his Father in Heaven to spare her life. Little Alice lived and became a favorite of the family, especially Maria. Now in 1904 she received word that Alice had died when her first child was born. Her death was a great shock to her and she grieved continually.

Along about 1920 Will and Maria moved to Rexburg on five acres of land just west of the canal that runs through the west side of town. The home on the property was like a doll house or so it seemed to me as a child, when we went there to visit. I don't recall for sure how many rooms -- three, it seems to me as I think of it now -- but it hugged the ground and was surrounded by large shade trees and bushes. Maria always planted flowers wherever she was and here was no different. She had flowers of all kinds all over the place. Out between the currant bushes and at the ends of the garden rows, little waxy yellow flowers lined the small garden ditches and tall rows of hollyhock followed the fence lines. On her front porch sat the biggest oleander bushes, one white, one pink, sometimes a cloud of color.

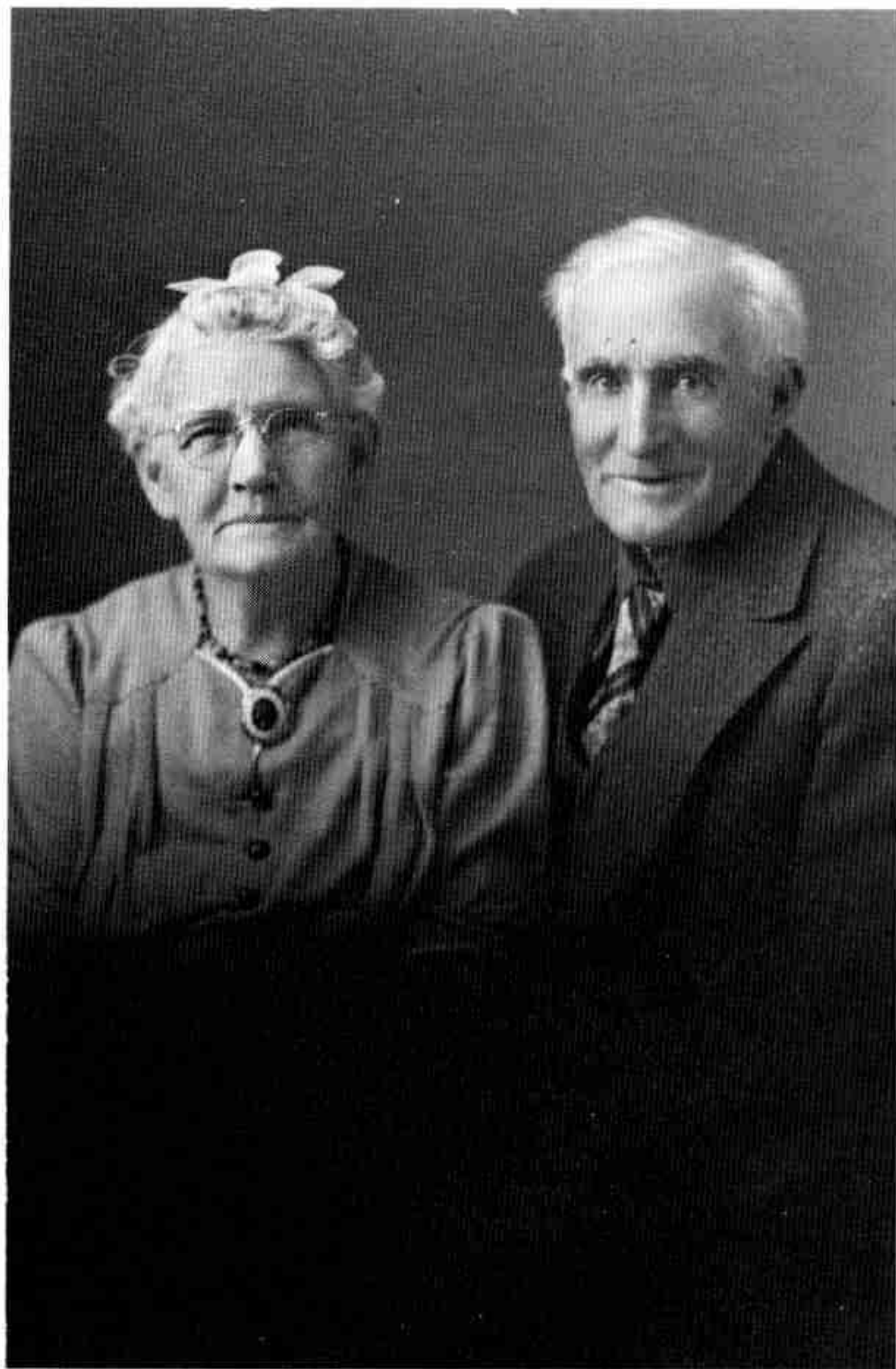
The first summer they were away from the farm, their renter, a Mr. Jenkins, set fire to the large



hay stacks to collect an insurance payment on them. Will had to let him go and they went back to the farm. Again in 1922 they came to town and Carl took over the farm. Maria was unhappy however about the arrangement and once more they went back to the farm. The summer of 1927 Will had a terrible battle fighting off a siege of pneumonia, the sickness so weakened him he couldn't go on with the heavy work, so Carl and his family moved back to the farm again in the fall and Will and Maria went back to town, this time to stay.

Will still kept his cows and horses and raised their hay on acreage around the house and barns. The city of Rexburg hired him to plow the snow off the city sidewalks after heavy snow storms. He built a wooden affair that his horses could be hitched to and they would pull this through the drifts pushing the snow back and leaving the walks clear.

A few years after their last move to town they built a new rock home just north of their little house and here did another landscape job. Apple trees, berries, flowers and lawns were all part of the project. Maria was proud of her new home. She had been a bit unhappy about leaving her house on the farm for she had loved it there and many hours of work and pleasure were associated with it. She had been given all the egg and butter money during her years of marriage and much of this had been tucked away. She had been very frugal and somewhat of a hoarder over the years and now her careful management paid off. Completed, her new home was a dream come true. She had hot and cold water in the house for the first time in her life, more kitchen cabinets than she had ever had and a full basement to explore. Their new land of Idaho had been good to them. Maria's mother lived with them for years and during sickness, a broken hip and the ordinary problems of old age, was quite an added challenge. She was treated with kindness and

consideration, especially by Will. She spent a short while with her daughter Amy in Butte, Montana, but was soon back with Will and Maria and remained there until her death in 1938 (age

93) at which time Maria was seventy years old and was more than ready for a few years alone with Will and the rest it gave them.

William was a well-built man, strong and capable of many hours of hard work. He was about five feet ten inches tall and weighed about 180 pounds. A pleasant looking man, he had coal black hair and very blue eyes that invariably held a mischievous twinkle in them unless he was annoyed, and then they could pierce straight through one. He could calm the feelings of an unhappy child and check the flow of tears with his humor and wit. He was a wonderful person, and it just wasn't in his nature to be dishonest or harsh or mean. When he would tease and joke with his grandchildren his blue eyes would twinkle mischievously and yet he was stern in his disciplining, both with himself and his family. As he grew older he was a very gracious old gentleman. His black hair had grayed and the hard, harsh labors of his years had stooped his shoulders a bit, but he loved life and was always busy. He gardened, kept up his raspberry and strawberry patch and found great enjoyment in the care of "Prince" and "Flax", his two beautiful sorrel horses. They were combed and curried and kept clean and shiny. Although "Prince" was a feisty animal and would kick the moon from its place if given a chance, he never kicked Will, and so he kept him because the team was so beautifully matched and Will enjoyed the challenge they presented. Maria often said he loved his team of horses more than he did her. These tasks he did because he loved doing them and he continued to care for his horses until the final year of his life. He still cared for them long after he had any use for them, just because of the joy of owning and caring for them.

And then one day he became very ill. He was taken to the hospital for surgery, but after the operation the pain and sickness were still with him. His appendix had been removed and it proved not to be the problem. He gradually became weaker, and one evening asked to be administered to. After the administration he said,

"Oh, if I could just get out of this bed long enough to be baptized, that is all I'd ask."

This thing he had neglected, partly of bitterness caused as a boy when his mother, as a plural wife, was left alone to make out for herself and partly as he said, "Maria has never asked me to." But he was never granted this desire. Death claimed the gallant old gentleman on November 23, 1949, shortly after his eighty ninth birthday, at their home in Rexburg.

Ben Summers, a son of Mary and John, tells of going to see Will when he was in the hospital shortly before he died. Ben said as they came to the door Will was on his knees in the middle of the bed, tears streaming down his cheeks, trying to say a prayer to his Father in Heaven. He told Ben and Brother Nef that his daughter, Stella, had been teaching him what to say and he had so wanted to be able to ask for a blessing and during all his life he had never learned to pray.

Some time after his death Ben wrote the following concerning Will: "Will and Maria Byrne were very close friends of my parents, John and Mary Summers. They all emigrated together from Utah to Burton in 1887 and each family homesteaded 160 acres joining each other.

"They worked together and each raised a good family. They were all good neighbors and sincere friends.

"I took over our farm in the spring of 1926, as my father had died in 1914 and mother had rented the farm ever since.

"I then got to know Will Byrne better than ever. He was like a father to me. I didn't have enough machinery to start with and he insisted that I use whatever I needed of his.

"Mr. Byrne was a good horseman and took much pride in his horses. He was a good worker and was as honest as the day was long.

"He was not a church goer, but lived a good clean life and I didn't know what was really in his heart until at age eighty nine he had a major operation in the hospital in St. Anthony, Idaho. After the operation he realized that he was in a serious condition. His daughter, Stella, who was with him in the hospital called me on the phone and asked if I would bring Emil Nef with me and come and administer to her father. We were at his bedside shortly and found him in tears. He said that Stella had been helping him offer a prayer and asked us to ask the Lord to spare his life long enough for him to be baptized a member of the Later-day Saints church. He told us that he had known for a long time that the church was true, but just couldn't bring himself to be baptized.

"We did as he requested, but couldn't promise him that he would live. He passed away a few days later, but in time his work was done for him in the temple and I'm sure he would accept it over there and continue to advance."

To those of us who survive, he personified all that is good and gracious. He was courteous and thoughtful to those around him; pleasant, agreeable to work with and in many, many ways so genuine and true. He was kind and gentle and yet had the strength and determination to train a string of strong-willed horses to do his bidding unquestioningly and yet they loved him and allowed him liberties they would not tolerate in anyone else.

Maria lived eight years after William's death, living alone for a while. Then her son, Ortez, and his wife moved into her home with her. She was having some health problems and would, on occasion, black out and fall, so the family felt it unsafe for her to be alone. The home was finally sold and Maria spent some time with each of her children, but soon settled herself in her daughter, Cecel's, home in Ogden, Utah, and was there until her death, December 3, 1957, at age eighty-nine -- three months before her ninetieth birthday.

Maria was not a very large woman, with blue eyes and brown hair. She was very pleasant at times, but she was very strict in her disciplining, almost to the point of being sharp on occasions. She tended to be quite partial to certain grandchildren, which was observed very keenly by the others. Grandchildren were not allowed to be unruly or trample through her flower beds or gardens. Her love for flowers was apparent everywhere she was, either in potted plants in her home or perennials or annuals growing in her yard.

She had given much of herself in taking care of her family and her mother and during difficult times had raised a daughter of her younger brother, Joshua. This girl, Edna Terry, lived with Will and Maria for five years at one time, and for shorter periods on other occasions. Edna said their home was the nearest thing to a home she had ever known and she was comfortable there. Maria was friendly, a considerate and helpful neighbor, often helping in times of sickness and new babies in the area.

## JAMES BYRNE AND MARY AGUSTA HOPKINS

### James Byrne

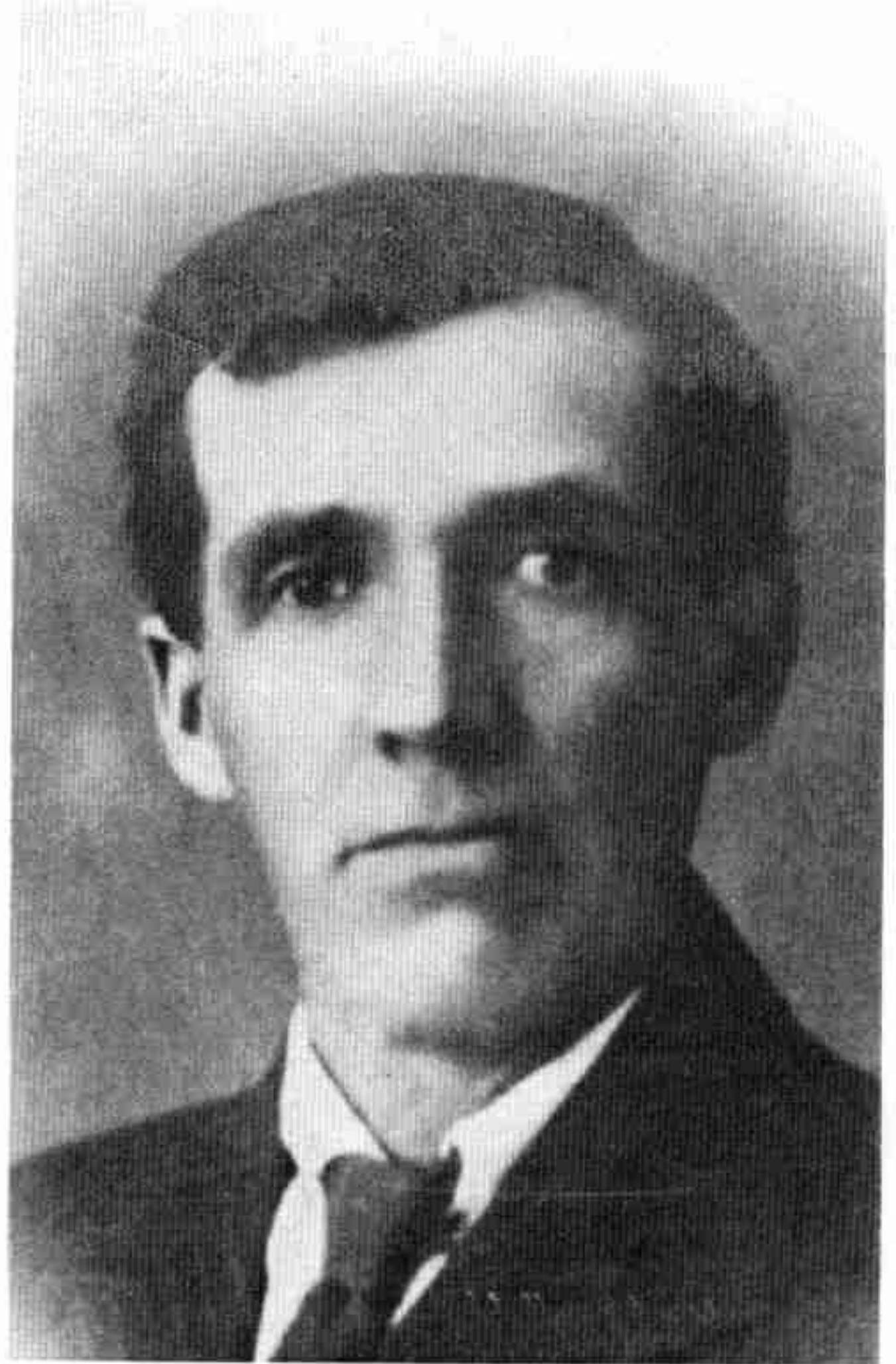
James Byrne was the third child of Moses Byrne and Anne Beus. Anne Beus was the second wife of Moses Byrne in a polygamous marriage. Jim (James) was born 11 March 1862 in Ogden, Weber County, Utah.

Anne Beus and her family lived in Ogden, Utah and Moses and his first wife, Catherine Cardon, lived at Piedmont, Wyoming. Jim Byrne spent a lot of time at both places.

When Jim was about seven years old, at Piedmont, Wyoming, his older half brothers were going hunting. Jim wanted to go along, but they did not want him to. They were on horses and he was on foot. He followed them into the hills. Because he was walking, his brothers thought that he would give up and go home, but he followed them into the hills and got lost. It was in the fall of the year and nights were cold. He came upon some of his father's cattle and decided to stay with them because it would soon be time to round up the cattle, and when they found the cattle they would find him too. It didn't enter his mind that they would come looking for him. He spent three days and two nights alone in the hills. When they found him he was still with the cattle. That was only the beginning of many interesting experiences for Jim Byrne.

At one time in his youth his job was to haul hay to the crews working in the timber. He loaded the wagon and started off. The load was too wide to get through the opening in the trees. He decided he would have to chop the tree down. He was young and it was the first tree that he had cut down. When it fell it fell between his lead team and his wheel team -- quite a predicament for a young lad!

At one time the government sent surveyors in to map portions of the Uintah mountains. They needed a guide who could help them through the mountains. Jim Byrne was recommended to them as a young boy who knew the mountains. He spent most of one summer as a guide for these surveyors.

Jim Byrne had many experiences in those days that made men of young boys. Jim and one of his half brothers were looking for cattle out from Piedmont, Wyoming. They split up and agreed on a meeting place. When he didn't show up Jim went looking for him. He found his tracks and found where he had been hit by lightning. It looked like he had tried to crawl to the creek to get a drink of water. Jim found him fallen over in the creek, dead.

Jim acted as driver for his father, Moses Byrne. When Moses traveled, Jim would drive him in the buggy, wait for his business to be concluded, and drive him back home again.

Jim told of cattle wintering on the range in Wyoming. Grazing lands were not fenced and they would ride to keep the cattle off the hay ground. His father put up hay for the pony express. When winter came they only brought in the weak and ailing cattle to feed and care for. The others stayed on the range all winter. He tells of seeing cattle freeze to death while standing up, so that you could ride your horse up to them and put your foot into the side of the cow and push it over.

Jim knew how to take care of himself in the wilderness and bad weather. He could not understand how a man could freeze to death if he just knew what to do. Many times he was out in bad weather. He would dig a depression down where the snow was drifting, put his saddle blanket over him, and let the snow drift in and cover him up. He said a man could not freeze like that because the snow was a good insulator and would keep him warm. He claimed a man could survive with only a pocket knife and matches.

After polygamy was outlawed, Jim took the responsibility of finding a new home for his mother and her younger children. He was 28 years old when he left Piedmont, Wyoming on a saddle horse and leading a pack horse. He came down the Hoback Canyon in Wyoming and on down the Snake River to the Upper Snake River Valley. He located the place in Sunnydell (now called Archer). A year later his mother, Anne, sisters Anne and Martha, and brother, Lew came from Utah. They left March 20 from Ogden, Utah at dark and arrived in Pocatello, Idaho the next morning on the train. Then they camped the next night out of Pocatello, the next night in Blackfoot; the next night in Shelley and the next night in Idaho Falls. Jim met them at Idaho Falls. They camped that next night at the Cedars west of Labelle at the Edwards Place. They forded the river south of the present W. D. Cook place in Archer. Will Byrne, Jim's older brother, had come to the valley three years previous and had settled in the Burton area.

When Jim Byrne came to the Snake River Valley he bought Dave Wilcox's desert entry and Boyd Wilcox's squatter rights to the present place in March 1890. They sold because they could not get water to the place. It was located at the base of the foothills. They had tried digging several wells but were forced to give up when they hit lava rock. Jim had noticed water seepage at the site of the present spring near the hill called Round Top. He tunneled back into the side of the hill 80 feet

and timbered the top like a mine shaft until he found the place in the rock where the water was coming from. He piped the water about a half mile down the hill to the house and yards. Later he built a cistern about a quarter mile away. That was the way they got drinking water and water for the stock until about 1952, when his son, Ross, dug a well.

When Jim first came to Idaho the big issue was either Mormon or non-Mormon. To try to get the people interested in something else he called the first meeting to organize the Silver Republican Party in this area. It was this party that got William E. Borah started in his political career.

After first coming to Idaho, Jim grazed his cattle in Teton Basin and then would drive them over the hills to the home place in Archer, Idaho to winter them.

When he first came here there was no sagebrush on the hills. The grass would be up to the stirrups on a horse. Sagebrush came in after the ground was overgrazed. When he broke up the ground to farm it he had five head of horses on a one-bottom plow. When it got stuck in the buffalo grass sod, he would have to chop the sod up with an axe to get the plow out.

He raised both cattle and sheep. The hills were all open range. The ranchers would try to get sheep shearing done early and be the first to get to the range for the best feed. One year Jim was quick to get to the summer range and a foot of snow came. They spent the next several days cutting young quaking aspen tree branches to feed the sheep.

Jim Byrne was instrumental in getting the Sunnyside Canal built and functioning. He was one of the stockholders who mortgaged his place to help finance it. The water got through in 1891. A corporation was formed and James Byrne made president. This first canal was sometimes called the Byrne ditch.

Jim Byrne was noted for his good horse teams. He had the reputation of a fine horseman. All the men who worked on the canal were interested in a team owned by Jim named "Buck" and "Deck." They each weighed between fourteen and fifteen hundred pounds. "Buck" was a buckskin, and "Deck" an irony gray. No one around the country owned a finer team and none but the best teamsters were allowed to drive them.

Jim was about 5' 8" tall, with dark brown hair and hazel eyes. In his later years he was hard of hearing. He went to school for parts of three years and felt that was enough for anyone.

Jim Byrne was 49 years old when he married Mary Augusta Hopkins Jensen, 21 December 1911. She had come out to work for him on the ranch cooking for the hired men. She had two little girls, Grace and Lucille. Jim and Mary had two children of their own: Velma Ann, born 14 September 1912 and James Ross, born 19 November 1917. Grace and Lucille loved Jim Byrne dearly. They tell of the patience he had with them and how they loved to be with him. They were both very small when their mother married Jim Byrne, so they considered him their father. Grace tells about figuring his grain receipts for him, collecting the money and depositing it in the bank. It pleased her that Jim trusted her to do those things for him. He built a house in Rexburg so the children could go to school. They spent the summers on the farm and the winters in town. Jim still spent most of his time on the farm.

Jim went into the hospital for a prostate operation in 1944. The operation went well but other complications and infection set in and he never left the hospital. He did not want to be administered to, and J. R. Beus, a cousin, said he could understand why Jim felt the way he did about it because he knew the circumstances which existed at the time Jim left Utah and brought his mother and her family to Idaho. No one thought to question J. R. Beus further to determine what the problems may have been. Jim Byrne was not one to talk about his problems; so, in a way it is fitting and in character that we do not understand this part of the man's life.

Jim Byrne died 20 June 1944 in Salt Lake City, Utah at the age of 82. He is buried in the Sutton Cemetery at Archer, Idaho.

Speakers at Jim's funeral referred to his being a quiet, unassuming man who loved his home and family, being respected in the community for his contributions to build it up and his way of life. They also spoke of his efforts to deal honestly with his neighbors and living by his creed, even though he was not a church-going man. Jim Byrne had a sense of humor too. One day D. G. Taylor, quite a religious man, met Jim on the street and said, "Now that you've moved to town, I'd like to see you in church, Jim." Jim answered, "Well, I gave up all my bad habits a long time ago. Church is just for sinners."

Jim's son, Ross, wrote the following tribute to his father at the occasion of his funeral:

"By nature he was patient and retiring, preferring the quiet life of the farm to that of any other. He was very devoted to righteous living, and although tolerant and respectful of other people's views, religion, and beliefs, he adopted for himself a code of living he thought was best, and once adopted, he never deviated from his course. Very confident in his own ability, he was resolved to keeping his own council and although firm in his convictions and steadfast in maintaining his views, he was reluctant to force them on others. Though willing to share the hardships of others, he preferred to endure his alone. He had little use for pretense or insincerity and carried out his work without prejudice or causing injustice to anyone. So as he lived he died, very quietly, without fear, envy or hatred. We are very grateful for the privilege of calling him Father."

## MICHAEL BYRNE AND HATTIE AMANDA HANSEN

### Michael Byrne

Michael Byrne was the fourth child of Anne Beus Byrne and Moses Byrne. He was born on Monday, November 23, 1863 at Ogden, Utah. Of his childhood I was able to learn little, but he told me that he spent his summers with his maternal grandmother, Marianne Combe Beus so that she would not be alone and he was able to help her in many ways. She lived to be ninety-six years old and was a very independent person and he learned this from her. His childhood was spent in Weber County, Utah in the area where he was born. As he grew older he started working with the sheep as a herder. It was in 1881 that he brought sheep to the City of Rocks in Idaho. From his personal description of the place, this was near the present town of Oakley, Idaho. While working with the sheep he traveled all over Utah, Idaho, Nevada, Wyoming and a short distance into northern California. He made the remark as he told me this that there were no farms in the Twin Falls area and only two or three houses in the Pocatello area. The year 1881 also saw him helping to build the railroad through Pocatello to Idaho Falls. It was a narrow gauge road then.

As he worked with the sheep he saved his money and for thirteen years he bought a few each year, in order to establish his own herd, which he did successfully. In 1889 he came to the Teton Valley as one of the pioneers of that area. He settled at Fox Creek, where he farmed with his brother.

When polygamy was abolished by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day saints, he assisted his mother when she moved to Sunnyside, Idaho. She was the second wife of Moses Byrne, so it was necessary for her to become independent of him. However, he provided stock: horses, cattle and sheep for the farm. With the help of her sons, Michael and Louis farmed 400 acres of land. The livestock were shipped to Pocatello where her sons picked them up and drove them on to the farm.

On October 29, 1891 Michael Byrne and Hattie Amanda Hansen were married by Miles Cahoon, Justice of the Peace in Bingham County. She was from a nearby area called Burton. Her parents were James (Jens) Ambrose Hansen and Eline Evertsen Hansen, formerly of Denmark. Hattie was the second child of their family to be born in America. They lived at Hyrum, Utah, where she was born, and later moved to Burton, Idaho.

After seven days of marriage Michael and his bride returned to Fox Creek to make their home, on 160 acres of land. They raised a lot of wild hay for the cattle. They were among the first eighteen families in the valley, so neighbors were few at that time. But life was good for them, for at one time they possessed 100 horses, 500 head of cattle and 4,200 sheep. They lost the sheep through the dishonesty of a man who had leased them for the amount of \$80.00 a month for a year. He suddenly disappeared, taking all the sheep with him, leaving them without the main source of income they depended on for their livelihood.

The year 1892 saw Michael Byrne appointed to the position of Post Master at Fox Creek, the last stop before crossing the mountain to Jackson Hole, Wyoming. He was the second man to hold this position, which he held for eighteen months, and he was replaced by his wife Hattie H. Byrne, who held it for two years. The post office was located in one corner of the room of their log cabin home. The mail was protected when necessary by the United States Cavalry, and at one time when there was fear of trouble with the Indians, the cavalry rode up, prepared to stay on his land to protect the mail. He refused to allow them to remain there because he was friendly with the Indians and he felt that the presence of the troops might incite unnecessary trouble or create unfriendly relations with them. This small log cabin home had only a dirt floor for several years, and three children, Edwin Michael, Arthur James and Andria Alean, were born there, before a wooden floor was installed. The mail for this post office was brought by train to St. Anthony.

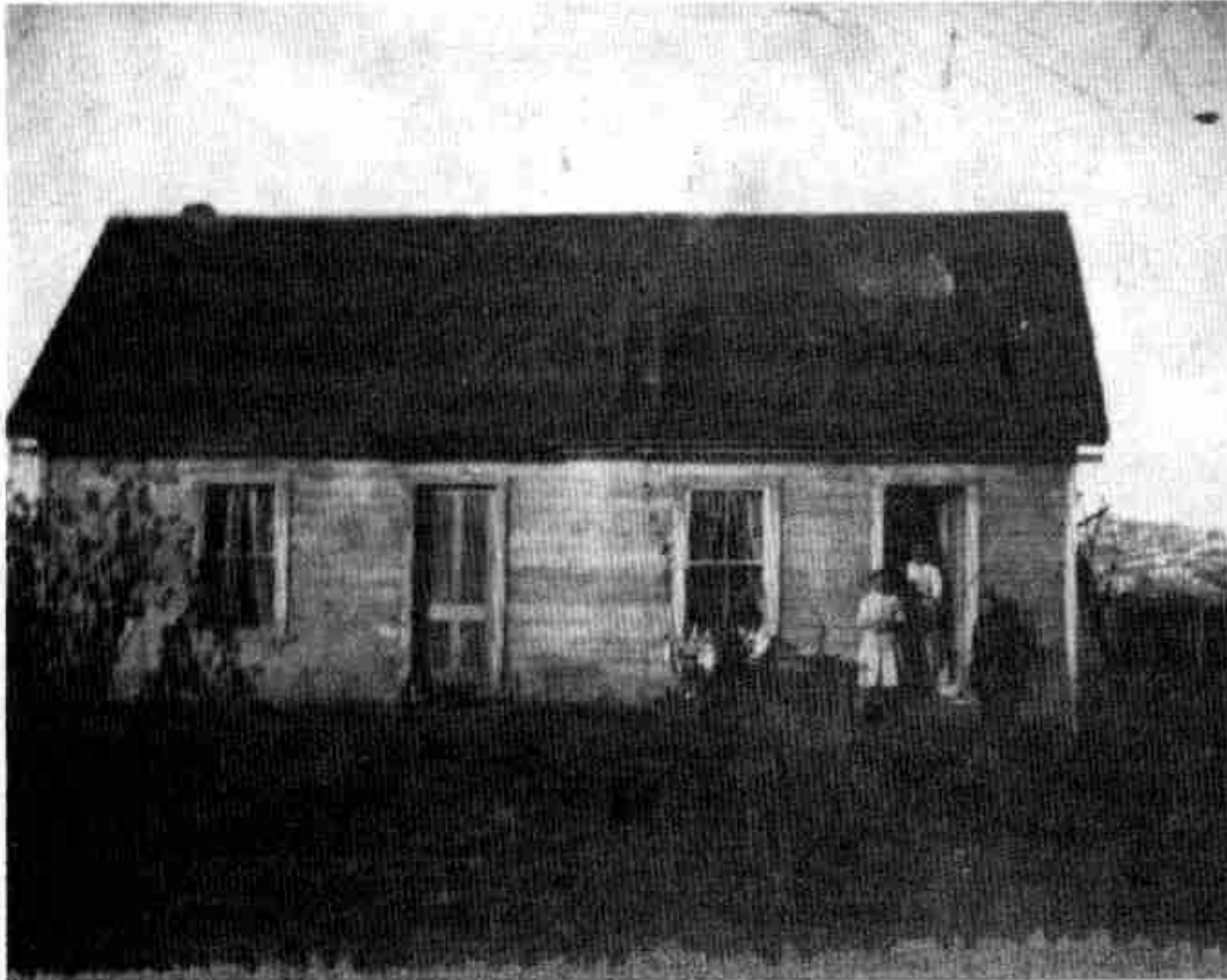

Here it was picked up and delivered once a week to Chapin, formerly Fox Creek, by horse and rider or by team and wagon. This service was provided for two years, and then daily service, five days a week was instituted. Mr. Edward Rigen was the mail carrier at this time.

As his own family grew he became one of the community leaders to sense the need for a school building. He helped build the school even to buying all the windows and doors, plus the lock to secure it. He became the first school trustee, and became the chairman of the school board, a position he held for 25 years. This building served not only as a school, but as a community center for all church and community activities. This was called the Carpenter school, and was located by the Teton River, about one and one-half miles from the Byrne home. The first teacher, a Mr. Sandy, was hired by him. Mr. Nealy Anderson was the first teacher in the Chapin school with a salary of fifty dollars a month.

In 1893 or 1894 there were some problems with the Indians, and Michael went with the other men of the valley to see what could be done to settle the issue. He left his wife and baby alone without even a gun and when this was questioned by some of those with him he replied, "They are all right. I have no problems with the Indian people. They are my friends the same as you are." As the years passed many carrots, apples, and other food

products were traded to the Indians for boxes of beads. I remember my mother showing me how she could do the beadwork when I was a small child, so I assume she must have learned it from those people. Again we see the wisdom of feeding rather than fighting, of being friends rather than enemies. In that same year Michael Byrne became the road overseer for the valley, keeping this position until 1902.

All the necessary items for the farm and household, except what they could provide for themselves, was hauled from Pocatello, a distance of about 130 miles. They used a three-bed wagon and four horses, taking several days for the trip. My mother recalled that on one such trip he brought her and her sister, Eldora, each a lovely rocking chair. They still have them at this writing (1979). This tells us that he believed in fine quality, even to his children's toys. At one time my mother was offered a good sum of money for hers by a skilled wood finisher. He told her that the chair was hand carved, and of solid hardwood. She also told of how impatiently the small girls waited until the teams were driven to a place where the load could be unloaded.

He was a conservationist of natural game. He refused to let the deer that came down to the farm to drink from the milk cans be shot on his land. This was a wild, natural country, unspoiled by man's deprivations, and he tried hard to keep it that way. It was a land that demanded much of its inhabitants. They not only had to have physical strength, they had to have physical and moral courage as well, just to continue living there. This was the badge of pioneer people. To illustrate the above statement, the story was told by my grandfather that his daughter Anne was sent out one

day to bring the cows in to be milked. On her return she told her parents that she had seen a pretty kitty. It was a cougar, and the hunt was immediately started to locate the animal, lest it harm someone, or the stock. Buffalo, elk and moose were also plentiful in the area, but the wolves seemed to be the greatest problem, and the children were warned to be very careful of them.

As the years passed Michael Byrne accepted more and more public offices, one of them being Justice of the Peace, a position he held for forty-two years. As Justice he married three of his own children: Alean to George A. Holland; Eldora to John T. Larsen, and Edwin M. to Edith Wood. The first two marriages took place in 1916, the third in 1920. Then again in 1939 he performed a family marriage. This time it was his granddaughter, Ethel, a daughter of Laura and Arthur. As the prospective bridegroom, Marvin K. Bisbee was in the service of his country, grandfather asked that he wear his uniform as he had never performed a marriage with the man in uniform. Ethel states that she believes this was the last ceremony he performed, of about five-hundred. He must have had an interesting time of it, as he stated that he married ten couples in one day. He was 76 years old when he married his granddaughter, Ethel.

The year 1912 saw the railroad come to Teton Valley. The terminal was Victor, Idaho, about three or four miles from the Byrne home. His eldest daughter, Alean was a waitress at the cafe where the crew of that first train were served their dinner. She served the meal to Engineer D. C. Ryan and many years later found that they were

both living in Glens Ferry, Idaho. Senator Borah was also on that train to help the people of the valley celebrate this great event in their lives.

The year 1916 was a busy year for the family as there were now nine children to provide for. The family moved into the town of Driggs, and Michael was elected to the position of Probate Judge of Teton County. He had earned the respect of the people of the valley by doing every job he was asked to do in the best possible manner that he was capable of. He was a man, small in physical stature, but a large man in his willingness to serve his fellow man in any way that he could. He held the office of judge for six years. His law training consisted of a lot of home study of the law books of the day. He was a man of strict discipline and fair judgement and he enforced the laws of the county.

The first death in the family occurred on May 26, 1920, when their daughter, Lillian Grace, died of Diabetes. This was a severe loss to the family, but as pioneers do they took it in their stride.

The year 1922 was also an important year in his life, as he became a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. He was accompanied in this by his wife Hattie, a son, Ralph, and a daughter, Vernita. Three other family members had already joined earlier.

Upon retiring as Probate Judge he became the Water Commissioner and the City Marshall for the town of Driggs. As a child I usually spent two weeks with my grandparents and I have pleasant memories of my grandfather driving the water wagon around the town. It was equipped with two

large sprayers on the rear end which kept the dust on the roads down. The main street of Driggs was also the main highway going to and from Jackson Hole and Yellowstone Park, so at times there was considerable traffic and dust as the roads were unpaved. It was also not an uncommon sight to see a herd of cattle being moved from one place or another come down the road. These sprayers were great fun when grandfather allowed us to follow the horse-drawn wagon and play in the water spray. He also allowed my sister Florence and I to ride upon the high seat of that wagon, and we considered that a rare privilege because as I have been told, not many were so allowed.

As the city marshall he was always very much aware of the problems and needs of the citizens of the town. I remember walking through the streets with him on summer evenings and everyone speaking to him in a most friendly and respectful manner. I remember going into the local theatre with him as he checked to see that all was as it should be. I was horrified because we had no ticket and I expected to be bodily thrown out, but I learned that this was part of his job. If he left me at the theatre I found out that he had paid my ticket on his way out. On one occasion I saw him destroy a rather large liquor cache in his official capacity. He did not drink, and I had the feeling that he thought this was a pleasant part of his job. He was a staunch Republican all of his life, and anything he disliked he called it a Democrat. Most of the time it was in a humorous vein, but at times it became a serious situation. He seemed to have a natural ability to deal with people, and was known to be a very honest man, so there were few serious situations that developed.

As has been previously mentioned he and his wife became the parents of nine children: Edwin Michael, who married Mary Larsen and later, after her death, Edith Wood; Arthur James married Laura Dell Cover; Andria Alean married George A. Holland; Eldora Jane married John T. Larsen; Lillian Grace died; Anne Lyle married Sanford S. Thompson; Ralph Emerson married Cedora A. Marshall and later, after her death, Dorothy Densford; Vernita May married Edward Ecklund and, following their divorce, Joe Williams; Clarence Dale also died. This latter death occurred Dec. 16, 1941 while he was undergoing surgery. This was a great loss to Michael and Hattie, as he was a fine son, a great personality, a good musician, and had become the financial provider for the family. He was the Deputy County Assessor of Teton County. It was a loss to all who knew and loved him.

On November 23, 1949 Michael Byrne became 86 years old. This birthday marked not only his birthday, but fifty-eight continuous years of residence in Teton Valley. He was on that date the oldest living man in the valley, and though handicapped by some deafness and eyesight difficulties, his mind was very alert and clear. He underwent surgery to help restore his sight at St. Anthony Hospital in Pocatello, Idaho in 1947. His granddaughter, Mrs. Verla Byrne, a registered nurse, helped him during this time. This surgery and corrective lenses made great improvements in his sight.

As I remember my grandfather he was a very spry man, always busy, yet willing to talk to any and all who came to him. I remember being at their home one summer evening when a man drove a goodly number of cattle up to the front door of their home, which faced directly on the street, to have his cattle inspected by him. I was amazed at this procedure, being a city girl, but was soon assured that he was the cattle inspector at the time and this was a necessary procedure. Another time I recall that there was some irrigation water problem that needed prompt attention and he left immediately to take care of it, even though the evening meal was almost on the table. He ate on his return home. When automobiles came into common use they had one, and though grandma had little difficulty with it, Grandfather had been a horseman all his life and this machine did not respond the way his animals had, and was a source of consternation to him. Promptly at nine o'clock every night unless official duties prevented it, he retired for the night. He arose early and always wanted his meals served promptly.

I believe my grandfather was highly respected, not only by members of the community, but by his children as well. On many occasions while visiting there, one or more of his sons would come to consult him on matters of importance to them or the community. I was a child at the time, so I remember little of the subject matter, except that it usually concerned horses, cattle, roads or water problems. I also remember that various members of the community also came for advice. He was a man who thought clearly and spoke forthrightly about what he believed to be right. Even at his advanced age -- he lived to be ninety-two -- he could discuss politics, world and local events. He was hampered by his eyesight problem, which eventually became blindness, but he avidly listened to the radio and had the newspapers read to him by his wife. He lived close to the main area of

business in Driggs, and twice daily he would take his white cane and walk the town over, never fearing for his own safety. He knew and loved the people and he knew this love was returned by them, and thus never feared that he would be harmed in any way. He walked slowly, enjoying the smells and sounds of his valley. He talked to all as he walked along, so his trips occupied quite some time. I can't remember his ever complaining in my presence, even though I heard him discuss many subjects. He was often invited to his daughter's home in Pocatello, but would seldom consent to go, because he was afraid he would die away from his valley. He died in Driggs on the 24th of February, 1955. This was a time his family will all remember. My personal part in this started in Salt Lake City, Utah, where I and my two children boarded a train for Pocatello where we were to meet other members of the family and go from there to Driggs. There was a snowslide in the Bear River Canyon, and our train was held all night long in Brigham City with their local fire engines keeping water in the engines so we would be kept warm as we waited the night through. The weather was unfavorable, but we made it to Driggs. It was snowing lightly most of the time, but it became what they termed a "ground blizzard." The snowdrifts became ten to twelve feet high in some places and five and six in most. We made the trip to the Darby Cemetery, where grandfather was buried, not far behind a huge snowplow. We were actually marooned for three days by this storm. There were no phones, no trains, no cars or even snowcats that seemed to be able to get out of the valley. Grocery stores ran low on many items and for those of us who needed to communicate with loved ones and employers it was a most frustrating experience, but one I am grateful for now. I, for one, will not forget when Michael Byrne was buried in the Darby Cemetery February 28, 1955. It was a climactic ending to the life of a brave, courageous man, who had dared to pioneer a land, help build a community and rear nine children. His posterity numbers at this time, October 1979, 23 grandchildren, 58 great-grandchildren and some number of great-great-grandchildren.

## Hattie Amanda Hansen

Herta or Hattie Amanda Hansen was born June 10, 1875 at Hyrum, Utah, the last child of James Ambrose and Eline Evertsen Hansen. The other child, Fritz Peter, was also born in Hyrum, but the other seven children were born in Denmark, their native land. They are, in order of birth: Kirstine Wilhelmina, Wilhelmina, Doris Gunilda Olivia, Josephine, Hans Carl Villem, Johan Heinrick, Andrea, Fritz Peter, and Herta or Hattie Amanda. This family came to America not long after the railroad became a common means of transportation. They settled in the Hyrum area and James was one of the men who helped plan and plant the Logan Temple grounds. He had formerly been a palace gardener in Denmark. They moved to Burton, Idaho which is near Rexburg, in 1888.

On October 29, 1891 Hattie Amanda Hansen was married to Michael Byrne by Miles R. Cahoon, Justice of the Peace for the country of Bingham. They came to the Teton Valley at that time to make their home on land already owned by Michael. This was in the Fox Creek area, which later became Chapin, Idaho. He became the Postmaster there and after he relinquished the position, she became the Postmistress. This office was one corner of their log home, and at first the mail was delivered by horse and rider once a week, but later became a daily delivery.

Always one to help those in need, she was in constant demand as a nurse and midwife. She estimated that she had delivered 500 babies in the valley. She had set up a signal of a lighted lantern when she was needed so she kept a constant watch for it, and regardless of the weather she went; sometimes by sleigh, buggy, horse or even snowshoes, if it was necessary. I know that she delivered some of her own grandchildren.

She was a Relief Society visiting teacher for 32 years in Driggs and this does not include the

years she served out in the valley before she moved to Driggs in 1916. She was work and business leader for quite a long time when her children were small. She had also been a Primary Teacher. During World War I when the Red Cross was organized she was the second member in Driggs.

She was a true lover of nature and loved nothing more than to go to the mountains. She loved flowers and collected rocks from all over the world, as her many friends all remembered to bring her gifts as they travelled about. The many countries visited by the servicemen were all represented by gifts, cards and letters. She was a vivacious type person, short in stature, but always engaged in some activity. She was a great support to her husband, Michael, as he performed his many public duties. She was also a good mother, rearing nine children in a pioneer home.

I remember going to their home as a small child, and she gave us home-made bread covered with thick farm cream and sprinkled with sugar and cinnamon. I could hardly wait to get there each vacation to see if she would remember to have it there. She always did. I loved flowers and rocks, so we got along very well. At the present time I have in my home gardens, rocks that were hers, given to me by my mother when my grandmother died. In 1948 my grandmother gave me two geranium plants that she had had for many years, and at this writing, 1980, I still have

plants from those first two. Each year I took cuttings from the plants and grew them and I have about 70 at the present time. There was a home beautification and improvement contest in Driggs, and Grandmother won the Special Award for her work, in 1954. I have a newspaper clipping, a picture of the winners at the Rotary Club meeting, where the awards were presented.

She also had another talent, that of giving readings. She traveled all over the valley doing this, and had some special clothes that she used for certain readings. She recited them all from memory, as nearly as I can remember. She loved humorous things, and had a good laugh over true humor. However, on the more serious vein, she was deeply affected by sadness, especially death, so I believe that I can truthfully say that my grandmother was a very sensitive type person. As one studies those who are artistically endowed we find that they are usually the sensitive type. In her lifetime she was sensitive to the needs of many as she went around on her nursing calls, raising a family of nine and helping with others who needed a home; and later in her life sensing the need to help beautify her own home and life as well as the community with her gardens and finally helping the cultural life with her poetic activity.

Her home was always open to friends, especially the young folks. Maybe this was because with a family of nine children, there must have been a houseful of friends around a lot of the time. Her children are as follows, Edwin Michael, Arthur James, Andria Alean, Eldora Jane, Lillian Grace, Anne Lyle, Ralph Emerson, Vernita Mae, and Clarence Dale. Two children and her husband preceded her in death. She died October 26, 1956 as the result of a hit and run accident, ending a long life of service to her neighbors and the community where she lived.

## ANNE BYRNE AND WARREN ELI COREY

Anne Byrne was born the fifth child and first daughter of Moses and Anne Beus Byrne in Ogden, Weber, Utah on April 18, 1871. Her early childhood was spent in Uintah on the benchland now called Combe Road. The education she received was in the Uintah school house. She attended school through the eighth grade.

Anne won many honors with her high marks and her good penmanship. The remark was made many times by her classmates, "Why should we even try, we know Annie will win."

Anne loved horses and had her own pony as a child. She entertained her grandchildren with stories of her pony and how she helped her grandparents make wine by riding her horse around a grape press. This was a sour wine and was put on the table at all three meals.

She worked hard learning the skills and doing the chores that were needed to keep a home and farm going. She was helped in these chores by her five brothers, David, Will, Jim, Mike and Louis and one sister, Martha. Her family was a polygamist family and she had four half-sisters and seven

half-brothers. These were the children of Moses and Kathryn Cardon Byrne. She was especially close to her half-sisters Kate and Minnie.

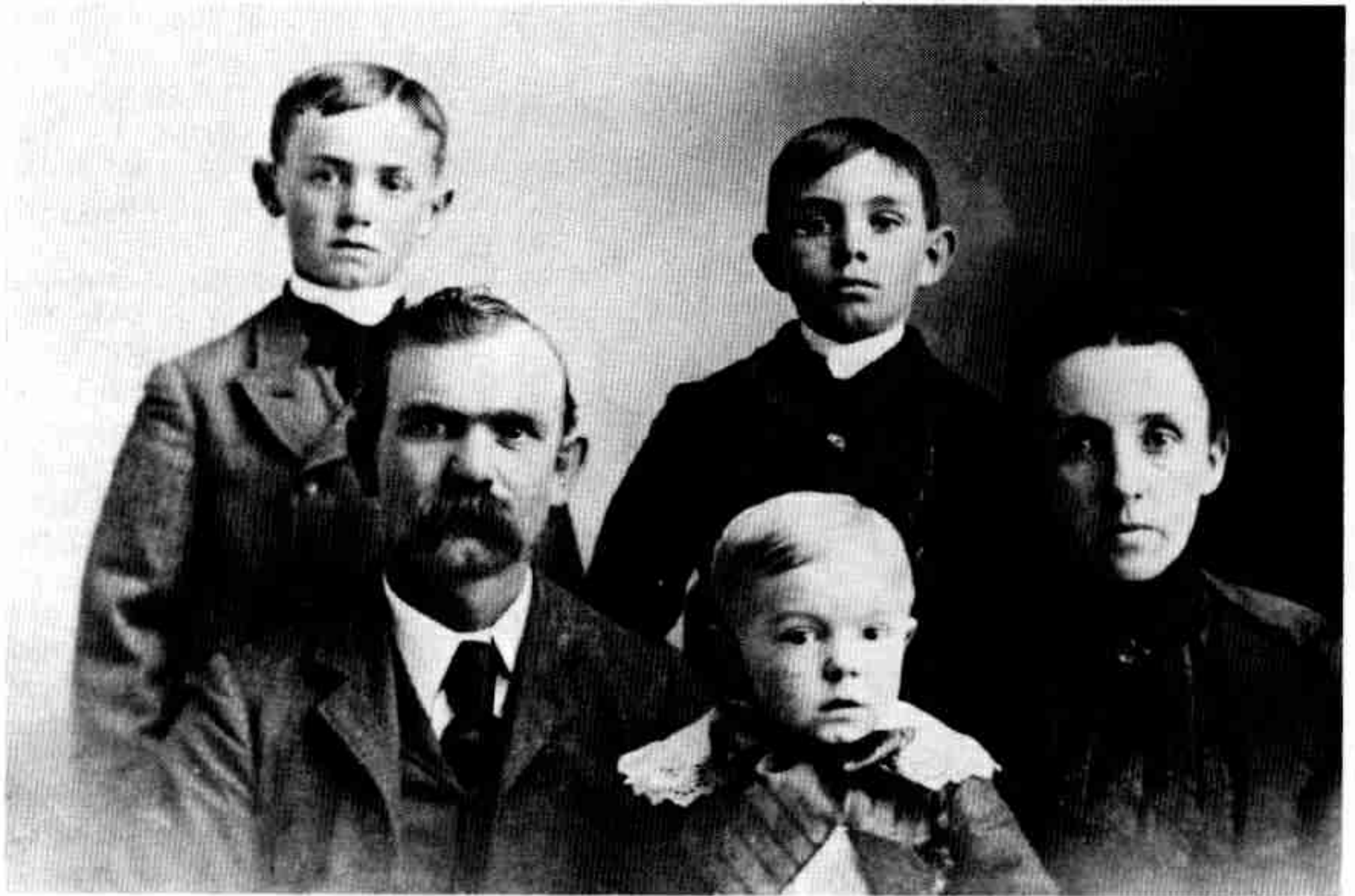
At the time polygamy was abolished by the Mormon Church Moses moved his first family to Piedmont, Wyoming where he became one of the state's most prominent men. His second wife Anne Beus and her seven children moved to Sunny Dell, Idaho. The family was a close-knit one, with the older boys working the farm and taking care of their mother and two sisters.

When Anne was twenty she met and was courted by a fine young man named Warren E. Corey.

He had been born and raised in Uintah, Utah and moved with his family to Sunnydell, Idaho to a large ranch. After a short courtship this couple was married January 1, 1891 in Sunnydell. This was the beginning of a full and eventful life together. During her married years Anne developed many talents.

The union of Warren and Anne produced six children, Glen, Roy, Archie, Earl and Clinton, and a baby girl that only lived for two days. Archie died at the age of three months. These children are buried in the family plot in Burton, Idaho cemetery. Clinton died 10 months after his birth in Ogden, Utah and is buried there. The remaining sons lived to see marriage and bless their parents with six grandchildren.

After about 10 years of ranching, with very little profit, Warren decided to move his family back to Ogden and work on construction. He had been raised in a construction family, as his father, W. W. Corey, had founded the Corey Construction Company. This move was an exciting one for the children as they made the trip to Ogden on the train. Upon arriving, the family was settled in a small home at 656 27th Street. The next years of their lives were very busy. Warren traveled a great deal in the construction business. Often, Anne would pack up the children and go with him. They made their first trip to Canada in 1904-05. While there she enrolled Glen and Roy in school. They, with two other children on the construction job, were the only Yankees in the school and got into lots of trouble defending themselves. Glen, being the oldest, always took the blame and received the punishment. While Anne was in Canada her mother Anne Beus Byrne died, April 18, which was Anne's birthday. She came home with her youngest son, Earl, for the funeral. The Corey Construction Company worked on two major construction jobs while in Canada. One was the CPR Irrigation Project in 1907.

Upon their return to Ogden they moved into a larger home at 625 27th Street. The family grew and prospered and moved into a bigger and nicer home at 2752 Madison Ave. This home had a beautiful spiral staircase and beveled glass in the doors and windows. Once again they moved. This time next door to Anne's sister, Martha, who had married Warren's brother Orson. This home was at 530 29th Street. The family's last move was to a home at 2839 Adams Ave. Warren and Anne lived there the rest of their lives. Anne really made this house a home. The Corey home was like a

hotel with their own children and friends, plus nieces and nephews who stayed with them. One niece named Verla Byrne lived there while attending nursing school. Anne liked a neat, clean home with everything done up. She liked to do things her own way and was a very determined woman.

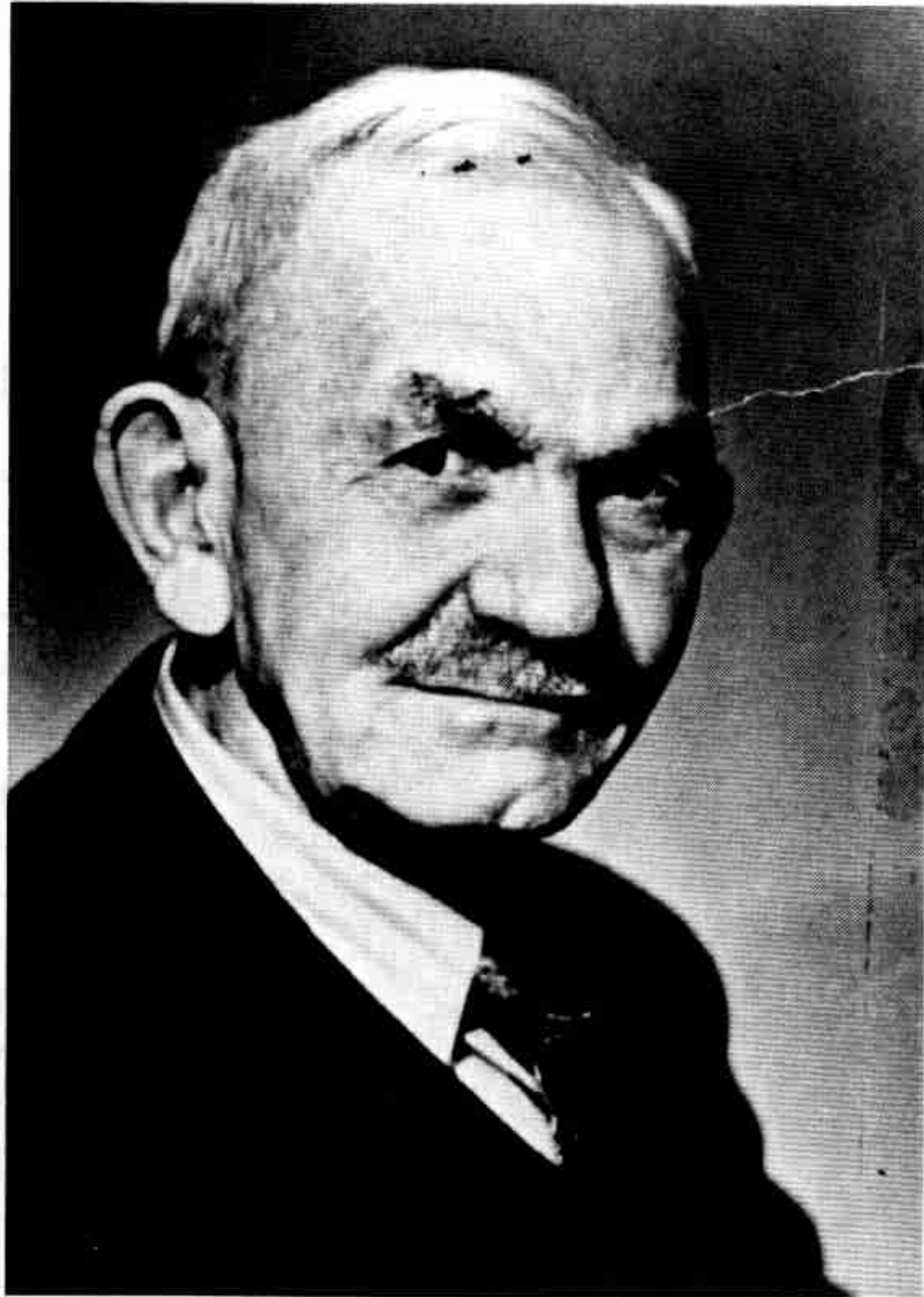
She developed many talents. She was an especially good cook, and was noted as a fine seamstress. Many beautiful wedding dresses, with hand-sewn beads and yards of lace, were made by her. Her good cooking skills were developed through practice. Many people received good meals because of her hospitality. They had a chicken coop in the back yard and she made many dishes using chicken. Her homemade chicken and dumplings were her specialty. She also made sugar cookies using chicken fat for the shortening. No one left her home hungry. There was a large dining room with a round oak table that was able to seat 16 to 18 people when fully extended. Thanksgiving was a memorable event. All the family enjoyed the giblets in the gravy and if you were not at the point of the table where the gravy boat started, by the time it arrived half way around, you were out of luck. Another Thanksgiving favorite besides the turkey was Oyster Casserole. The pies were always excellent!! Grandma always had either pie or cake on hand every day, and the grandchildren would stop daily either at noon or after school from Lewis or South Washington. I don't think Dick Corey ever made it home from Lewis School at lunch, he always stopped at Grandma's for a treat. Not only did family and friends find hospitality but construction workers like Bill Yiirs lived with them. Also Nita Porter, Bill Seavers and his wife Hazel and Platt

Fuller, who had just started in the trucking business, lived with them for a time. Her basement was large and if people were not staying there she stored their belongings in the basement. The basement was an exciting place for the grandchildren. Large trunks full of dress-up clothes, a Bendix washing machine that loaded at the front and the lid would sometimes fly off while spinning, and a fruit room full of the regulars like peaches and pears but also the unusual like the ground cherries and the tomato preserves. Warren would buy Annie a sack of Big J flour and if it met her expectations he would bring in enough to last two years. The Byrnes would visit from Idaho and bring a side of lamb.

Her grandsons, Dick and Bob, lived close and so spent lots of time there -- most every Saturday. When they could stay overnight she would warm the iron on the back of the stove and wrap it in paper and slip it into the foot of the bed to keep their feet warm. Both Grandpa and Grandma Corey were wonderful to be around and never cross to anyone. The only time Grandpa Corey

really lost his temper was when Cousin Earl Corey and Bob trimmed his mustache too close.

Annie was a member of the L. D. S. Church. She was baptized in the Weber River as a young girl. She was a member of the Ogden 9th Ward and served as a visiting teacher for 16 years, always doing good deeds and helping the sick and needy. During the flu epidemic she went to the homes of the sick with Dr. Ezra Rich to help in any way she could.

Annie was also a member of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers Camp J for twenty-four years.

It has been said many times of Annie that "her heart was good as gold and her ideals very high." The garden around her home reflected her love for nature and the outdoors. Her back yard was a beautiful rose garden. She had good neighbors. The Morrisons lived on the north and the Wilcox family on the south. She herself was a very good neighbor. Her grandchildren loved to stay at Grandma's house. It was especially fun when Grandpa sent them around the corner to Vetas Ice Cream Parlor for a quart of ice cream.

Her life was happy and full, being a lovely wife, efficient homemaker and loving mother, good neighbor and a dedicated daughter of God. She left a legacy of love, caring, work and happy memories to her three sons, three daughters-in-law, 6 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren and 30 great-great-grandchildren.

She died on September 11, 1953 and is buried in the Ogden city cemetery.

## MOSES LOUIS BYRNE AND LENA MAY WINTERS

### Moses Louis Byrne

Dad (Louis) Byrne was born in Uintah Utah, on August 8, 1874. His father was a polygamist. Dad went to schools in Utah, including the Logan Agriculture College, which was a big help to him in his farming and stock raising. My father, with his mother and brothers and sisters, Mike, William, Jim, Martha, and Annie moved to the Rexburg area.

He married Lena May Winters, daughter of Fredus Horace Winters and Phillis Alma Smith and together they had six children, Irvin, Loren, Alma (Barber), Delila (Hansen), Ray, and Eva (Mattson). Four members of this family are still living -- Loren, Alma, Ray, and Eva.

The home they were married in is one that Dad and Grandfather Winters built. It was a rock home that is still in use. The rock was hauled from the Lyman Creek Rock Quarry with a team and wagon. There is some carving in the front of the home which reads 1900. This is the year that they were married. After they were married, they homesteaded a dry farm about four miles east of the home. This was a big worry for mother, as the area was infested with rattlesnakes. Mother kept a shovel just outside the door and would use it to cut up the snakes. The homestead was a tract of land comprised of about 160 acres.

Dad liked to work with livestock. He worked for Smart and Webster, and also the Wood's Livestock Company. He would work with other men to ship stock back to Chicago, Omaha, and St. Louis. This work entailed feeding and watering the animals which were shipped back east on the railroad.

Dad liked to go to the woods hunting for huckleberries, and would ride a horse and leave the team driving to mother. We would go with other families. It was a fun outing for everyone.

When cars first came out, one was purchased for the family. The oldest son, Irvin, did most of the driving. Dad's driving was not the best. I guess he rode a horse so much of the time that he figured the car could manage on its own as the horse did.

He worked as president of the Stock Growers Association for 17 years and was the trustee of the school district in Archer for several years. Anyone who needed a helping hand could always depend on dad to help. On one occasion he planted a field of potatoes for a neighbor and was

offered fifty cents.

The Grange nominated him as Master of the Grange, and he served in this capacity for a number of years.

In the fall, wood for the winter would be hauled out from the hills. This served as our only heat in the rock home. The boys would help Dad haul the wood.

When my oldest brother was old enough to run the farm, Dad, Mother, my sisters, and I all went to Island Park, where we brought out ties for the railroad. This turned out rather badly, as very little money was paid for the ties and the work was rather hard. It seems as every job had its drawbacks. When supplies had to be purchased we would drive to Macks Inn with a team and wagon and ford the Snake River (the North Fork). This is not one of my happiest memories, because I was very frightened to have to cross the river. Dad would drive a team of mules quite often, but would never try to ford the river with them. He would always rely on his faithful horses.

In the spring of 1936 the decision was made to leave the old farm, so we moved about two miles south to a larger farm. There Father took care of a dairy herd and mother tended some chickens and a beautiful flower and vegetable garden. The boys took charge of the farming.

During these years Father's health was failing and he was in the hospital from time to time. Sometimes local and some of the time in Salt Lake City. After a stay in the hospital he stayed for some time with his son and daughter in Meridian, Idaho. One time he stayed with his son, Irvin, in Rexburg. Late in July of 1945 he became ill and was taken to a Rexburg hospital. He was hospitalized for about three weeks and passed away on the 12th of August, 1945.

## Lena May Winters

I was born in Tucson, Arizona May 9, 1882. My father worked in a bakery. When I was nine months old my parents went to Antimony, Garfield County, Utah. They stayed there for some time. Father cared for the mine and the equipment that were there when the Mormons had that. Scare of polygamy, 1890, some of the people from Coyote came up there and stayed with my parents.

We then went to Coyote and I went to school there. My father taught school for several years. We went from there to Park City. Father worked in the mines and I was taught to read and write by Mother. We were too far from any school. The men wore candles on their caps so they could see. They were working in the dark. Father would bring home with him the stubs of the candles and make horses, cows, and various things to pass away the evenings. The snow was so deep we never saw daylight.

Father would be wet from the water on the ground and dripping on him and he wore rubber boots all the time. Of evenings we would heat oats and pour in his boots to dry them for the next day.

We went back to Coyote and Father took up a homestead on Severe River, a few miles north from which is now a resevoir. We bought cows and made cheese for a living. We would make a load and then Father would take them to a town and sell them and bring back food and clothing. I helped milk all the time. He would do this in the summer and then in the winter he would teach school and music.

The year of 1895 my sister Mrytle was born. When she was six weeks old Father sold the place and decided we would go to Eagle Rock, Idaho, which is now Idaho Falls.

He chartered a cart and loaded all he could in it, sold the rest and he took a team. He led two horses and I drove a cart and led one horse and we started out for this place.

Mother was not too strong, so she stayed in the wagon all the time. We camped out entirely. When we got to Logan, we came across Sam Wilcox and Clough, his daughter, and Frank, his son. They were going to the temple. Father knew Grandpa and Grandma Wilcox, Dave, John, and Oz



in Coyote. He asked us to go to Archer.

We did and Father bought the place that we called the Thompson place, which is now called the old Winters place or the Daily place. We farmed. I worked out all the time with him. I plowed with an old sulky plow and every once in awhile it would tip over with me. I was not very large. I would get it up some way. I helped Father out all the time until my brothers got large enough to help, and then I went out to work at private homes for \$2.50 a week.

Father again taught school and music and played for dances and then I began to go out with him and soon I was old enough to have company of my own. August 8, 1900, I was married to Louis Byrne. We had six children, three boys and three girls. April 8, 1905, Mrs. Ann Byrne died and I went to keep house for James Byrne. Lou went to work for Smart and Webster. I stayed there until the spring of 1906.

We took up a homestead on Lyman Creek. We stayed there four years. Loren took sick with typhoid and we moved back on the old place and made a cash entry. We dry farmed for a few years. In 1923 we went to Macks at Island Park and I cooked for a crew of men. They got out mining props for a mine in Utah.

Irvin was then old enough to take care of the place, he and Loren. In the fall we came back again. In 1925 I went to West Yellowstone and cooked in a cafe with Clarence Burr. I then took up nursing and did that for awhile. I brought many babies to this world. I was a Grange member. I filled the office of Lady assistant Steward and Cares. I belonged to the Sunnydell Study Club. I have worked with the P.T.A. for some time. I was president of the sixth district and vice president and president of our own organization here in Archer.

August 12, 1945 I went to work cooking for the Archer hot lunch. For two years I worked at that in winter and in the summer I went to work for Jack Young at Wydaho Ranch at Ashton. Since that time I have worked in winter, spending summer with my brothers and sisters and my family.

#### Memorial Obituary of Lena May Winters Byrne

Lena May Winters Byrne was born May 9, 1882 at Tucson, Arizona, a daughter of Fredus H. and Alma Smith Winters. She passed away, Thursday, August 1, 1963 at Madison Memorial

Hospital at the age of 81.

Her family moved from Arizona to southern Utah and then when she was 14, she drove a team and the supply wagon most of the way as the family moved from southern Utah to Archer, where the family settled. She told of many interesting experiences on this trip and how they had to ford most of the rivers and streams.

Here at Archer, her father taught school and served as postmaster. She often rode a horse to Rexburg with him to collect the mail. Her family was quite musical and her love for music and dancing stayed with her most of her life. Her mother played the piano and other members of the family played instruments and they all enjoyed singing together and entertaining others.

She was married to Louis Byrne, August 8, 1900 at Arther. They farmed in the Archer area until the death of her husband in August 1945. To this union were born six children, Irvin Byrne of Rexburg, Idaho; Loren Byrne of Meridian, Idaho; Mrs. Alma Barber of Meridian, Idaho; Mrs. Delila Hansen of Clovis, California, who passed away in 1954; Ray Byrne of Terreton, Idaho; and Mrs. Eva Mattson of Hamer, Idaho.

She is also survived by 17 grandchildren, 29 great-grandchildren and the following brothers and sisters: Stella Smith of Temple City, California; Guy Winters of Seattle, Washington, Myrtle Campbell of Mountain Home, Idaho; Treva Howard of Arteria, California; and Jess Winters of Glens Ferry, Idaho. Brothers and sisters who preceded her in death were: Berl Casady, Maud Gibson and Fred Winters.

It was only little over a week ago that she attended the funeral of her brother Fred at Gooding.

During all her adult life, she did community work as a midwife and also as a member of the Relief Society. She, along with grandmother Sutton, helped care for flowers at funerals for approximately 35 years.

following her husband's death, she cooked at the Archer School for 12 years and during the summer months she cooked at summer camped in the area. Later she helped care for her aunt, Ida Sutton, for a year or two, and then she moved to an apartment in Rexburg and retired. She lived here by herself until a short time before her death, when she stayed at the home of her oldest son, Irvin.

Grandma Byrne had a wonderful sense of humor. She was always happy and could make others happy with her cheery disposition.

On one occasion, while on a trip to Gooding, she purchased a pair of shoes, but told the clerk she wanted something she could dance in. So after trying on the shoes she and the clerk danced in the isle of the shoe store to see if they fit well enough for dancing.

We all loved and respected grandmother and are surely going to miss her.
