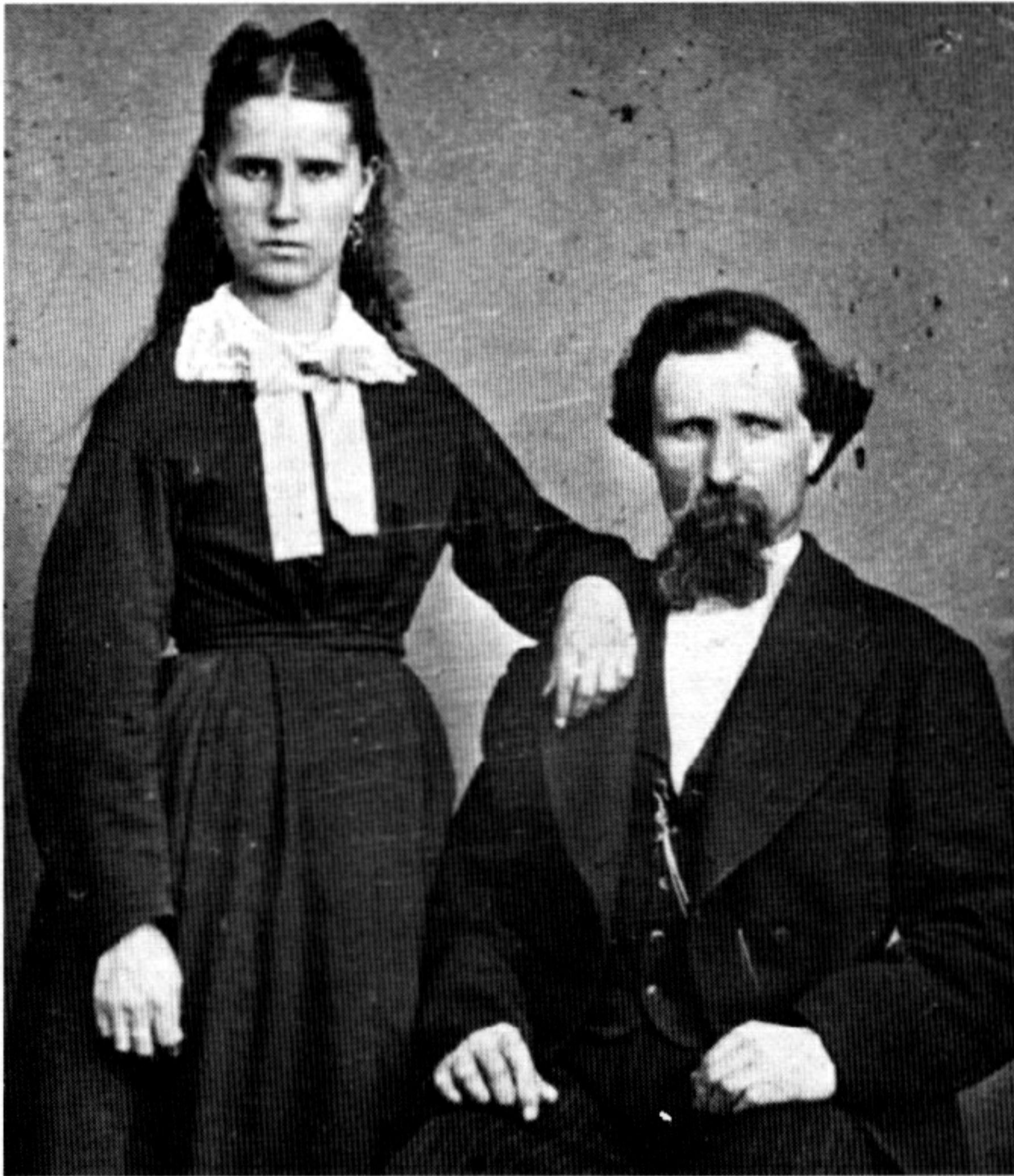

Magdalene Beus

Magdalene Beus was born on the seventeenth day of July 1853 in St. Germain, Piedmont, Italy. This town is located high in the Alps. Her father, Michael Beus, was a son of James Beus and Marie Madelaine Peyronel. Her mother, Marianne Combe, was a daughter of Jean Combe and Anne Rostan.

Magdalene was baptized into the L.D.S. church sometime during the year 1862 in the Weber river in Ogden, Weber Co., Utah by Bishop Robert McQuarris. She remembers that she was nearly nine years old.

They lived out of town at Burch Creek and did not have any close neighbors, so there were no playmates but brothers and sisters. She and her sister, Mary, played together. There was one friend, Dora Browning, her close friend, when she had a chance to do any recreation, also Amanda and Miranda Stohle (twins). They played jacks, but used rocks for marbles. She and Dora spent a great

deal of time in learning to talk correctly and corrected each other, which helped a great deal in learning the new language.

One time when she was very small she took very sick in the night and prayed to be healed and then called her father to administer to her. In the morning she was able to get up and do her work. Often, in raising her family, she would have her secret prayers for them, and they would get well through her faith.

Her father was in good circumstances and they had as good a home as anyone in those times. They all worked together to advance and make a living in this new world that had opened up to them when they accepted the gospel and emigrated to America.

Her schooling consisted of a few months each year, in the summer time when they were able to walk to town to attend. Her first teacher was a Mrs. Brown and also a Miss Canfield. She also had one other teacher who didn't belong to the Latter-Day Saint church. The school house was a large building located on the west side of the block where the City and County Building of Ogden now stands.

Her home tasks consisted of several duties, such as helping cook, doing dishes, sweeping, dusting, etc. She loved to make quilt blocks and made up many new designs. When she was about eleven years old she made herself a dress, making her own pattern and sewing it by hand. After this she had all the sewing to do for the family.

She and her sister, Mary, spent many happy hours in the hills around their house. They would take the herd of cattle up in the hills to feed. While watching them they would take great pleasure in learning of the flowers, trees, and growth around them. When the weather was favorable they would walk from their place down to where the tabernacle of Ogden now stands to attend Sunday School and other meetings (Their home was where the Weber school now stands). They would attend religion class after school, which was held in place of Primary.

One time, when she and her sister, Mary, went up in the hills to gather in the cows in the evening, their brother followed them and became separated from them. When they arrived home with the cows he had not returned. The family knelt down and prayed before they started out to find him. After quite a long search they found him fast asleep by a large tree.

On the 19th of December 1870 she was married to John Paul Cardon in the Salt Lake Endowment House. (She became his second wife, the first one being Susannah Boudin.) He lived in Logan, Cache Valley, and about once in a year he would go to Ogden to visit the Beus people, as they had come to this country in the same group and crossed the plains in the Edmund Ellsworth Handcart company in 1856. On one of these visits he asked her parents for her hand. She was seventeen years of age and his eldest daughter was just five years younger. She lived in Logan, Richmond, and finally settled on a farm in Benson. As she was the second wife she had to stay in the background, and hidden much of the time. She spent a lot of her early married life with Mary Cardon Merrill (now living in Preston, Idaho, a widow) the oldest daughter of her husband. She and Jean Paul Cardon were the parents of the following children:

She had many hardships in her married life, as she was in polygamous marriage and was alone in raising her family a great deal of the time. She was a very wonderful person and no one ever heard her complain of her circumstances. She was faithful in everything that was asked of her and

her prayers were answered on many occasions. When she was a small girl one Sunday President Brigham Young came to Ogden and all the people gathered together on Bishop West's lawn and listened to him talk. When he had finished speaking he shook hands with everyone. At this time he prophesied that the day would come when there would be a continuous city between Ogden and Salt Lake City and also that people should be careful with their needles as at some time they would be hard to obtain. She saw these things come to pass.

She also knew Apostle Ezra Taft Benson and Marriner Merrill, Apostle Lorenzo Snow and many others. Apostle Lorenzo Snow brought the gospel to her family in Italy. She, with her family, part of the Staley family, Susannah Goudin (first wife of John Paul Cardon) and the Chatelains came to Utah together in the Ellsworth company. They were 91 days coming from Liverpool to America. During the trip their drinking water was low and was portioned out one spoonful per person per day. She was carried a great part of the way across the plains, as she was so small. She spent the last years of her life with her youngest daughter, Katie Cardon Jensen.

John Paul Cardon

In order to understand the background and characteristics of my grandfather, Paul Cardon, it would be well for the reader to review the history of the Vaudois or Waldenses of Italy, and their persecutions at the hands of religious leaders of their day, as told elsewhere in this book.

My Grandfather, John Paul Cardon, son of Phillippe Cardon and Marie Tourin, was born December 28, 1839 at Prarustin, Italy. His family had found a place of refuge in the Italian Alps during the awful persecutions that raged in the Piedmont valleys.

They were of the Vaudois or Waldenses, and Phillippe Cardon was the second person in all of the Italian Mission to join the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He was the first person in his community, or locality, to join the church. This notable event took place under the direction of the late President Lorenzo F. Snow, who had opened that mission but a short time before. My grandfather Cardon's sister, Madelain Cardon Guild tells this story concerning an early experience with the gospel of Jesus Christ, as it was restored to the "Mormons" and the family's conversion to it. This is found in her autobiography:

When I was a child of about six or seven, in the year 1840-41 I received a remarkable manifestation, one which changed the career of my whole life. I desire to tell it just as it happened so that you may realize how I felt. I was upstairs in bed. A strange feeling came over me. It seemed that I was a young woman instead of a mere child. I thought I was on a small strip of meadow close to our vineyard, keeping father's milk cows from the vineyard. It seemed that I was sitting on the grass reading a Sunday school book. I looked up and saw three strangers in front of me. As I looked into their faces, I dropped my eyes instantly, being very frightened. Suddenly the thought came to me that I must look them straight in the face, so that I might remember them in the future. I raised my eyes and looked them straight in the face. One of them, seeing that I was afraid said, 'Fear not, for we are servants of God, and have come from afar to preach unto the world the everlasting gospel, which has been restored to the earth in these last days, for the redemption of mankind.' They told me that God had spoken from the heavens and had revealed His everlasting Gospel to a young boy, Joseph Smith; that it should never more be taken away, but that His kingdom would be set up and that all the honest in heart would be gathered together. They told me that I would be the means of bringing my parents and family into this great gathering. Moreover, that the day was not far off when we would leave our homes and cross the great ocean. We would travel across the wilderness and go to Zion, where we would serve God according to the dictates of our conscience.

When they had finished their message to me they said they would soon return and visit me. They took some small books from their pockets and gave them to me saying, 'Read these and learn.' They then disappeared instantly.

When I realized what had been said to me and what I had seen, I became frightened. I took my clothes in my arms and ran downstairs to where my mother was preparing breakfast for our family and hired men. As I came in she saw that I looked pale. She asked me if I was sick and I said no. Just at that instant I was unable to talk. My mother told me to sit on a chair and she would soon see to me, and learn what was wrong. Soon my father came in and she called his attention to me. She knew that I was not sick, that something had happened which caused me to look so strange. My father took me up, dressed me, and questioned me until I had told him all I had seen and heard.

Later in her life this scene was to be almost exactly duplicated in real life. Although she almost forgot it in the years in which she was growing up, it made a deep and lasting impression on her father and he always kept it in his mind.

In 1850, three Latter-day Saint, Elder Lorenzo F. Snow, a Brother Stenhouse, and Brother Toronto, came to Italy to open that mission. They stopped at a town called Palais de la Tour,

where they were not allowed a church or place of shelter in which to preach. Soon the people of Palais de la Tour became wild and crazy and organized into mobs and laid plans to drive these servants of the living God out of the country. Elder Snow called his companions together and proposed that all three of them go to the mountains and there fast and pray. This they did in humbleness of heart; they asked their Heavenly Father to look down upon them in mercy and guide them to the honest in heart and bless them in their labors. They were kneeling on a large flat rock on the mountain side, in fervent prayer to God that he might open the way before them that their journey and labor in that country might not be in vain. Instantly a voice came to them saying, "Cheer up, your prayer is granted and you shall meet with friends who shall protect you in your labor and who shall receive the gospel of Christ." (Elder Snow proposed that this mountain be known among people of God, henceforth and forever, as Mount Brigham and the rock upon which they stood as the Rock of Prophecy.)

Mrs. Guild writes further,

I well remember my father coming home on Friday or Saturday afternoon and asking my mother to get his Sunday clothes ready. He had just heard of these three strangers being at Palais de la Tour and preaching the same doctrine which the three strangers had taught me in my dream or vision when I was a child. I was just seventeen or eighteen years of age now. When he heard of their strange doctrine, he became so excited and so intensely interested that he could not proceed with his work. After he changed his clothes he started afoot in search of the strangers. He traveled over mountains and through valleys and arrived on Sunday morning in time to hear Elder Lorenzo Snow preach. My dear father was most happy to hear the pure truth, so earnestly explained. His heart was full of joy. After the meeting my father approached these servants of the Lord, shook hands with them, and kindly invited them to come to our home where he desired them to make their headquarters. They kindly and willingly accepted his hospitality. On the way home my father related unto them all about what I had seen and heard in my dream or vision. He stored it in his heart and in his memory and had kept it in his bosom, a secret until now.

When the Elders reached our house that Sunday evening they inquired for me, being interested in what my father had told them concerning me. I was not at home at the time, but was out on a small strip of meadow land. It seemed to be the identical spot I had seen in that vision of childhood so many years before. I was sitting on the grass reading a Sunday school book. I did not hear them until my father said to the elders, "This is my daughter who had the vision or dream concerning the strangers who told me to 'Fear not for they are the servants of God.'" Upon being introduced, I shook hands with each of them. They took some tracts or small books from their pockets and spoke the very same words I had heard in my dream. Thus was that remarkable manifestation partly fulfilled. As you read further you will learn that it was fulfilled to the letter.

The elders preached the gospel to this family and they soon joined the church. The gospel was not well received in this community and soon the persecutions began against those who had joined the church. Many of the people who had joined the church could not withstand the trials and persecutions and fell away and were excommunicated.

The Cardon family made plans to emigrate. Due to the opposition arising against the saints, it was hard to dispose of their property and possessions for a fair price, but the Cardons were blessed and were able to sell their goods and raise enough money to come to Utah themselves, as well as to pay for another family of five persons to emigrate also. Among the first families to leave were the Cardons, Stalles, Gaudins, (Gaudins were my grandmother Cardon's people) the Beuses and the Chatelains.

It was February 1854 when Phillippe Cardon, his wife and family, consisting of four sons and two daughters, left their native home to cast their lives and fortunes in with the "despised Mormons." Having already endured persecutions for their honest belief, it was nothing new for them to share in the hardships and persecutions that followed the Saints.

On a later date when the gospel had taken root in Italy, Elder Snow wrote that they went to the

mountains, climbed to Mount Brigham and the Rock of Prophecy and there, inspired by the grandeur of those lofty mountains and with the history of these people in mind, sang a Vaudois hymn, which has since become, in modified form, a much-sung hymn in the church: "For the Strength of the Hills We Bless Thee."

They arrived in Utah, October 29, 1854, with the Robert Campbell Company, settling in Weber County near Five Points, just north of Ogden. Their journey over land and sea was fraught with many dangers and trials. They had been promised that if they would live the principles of the gospel and trust in the Lord that they would reach their destination in safety, and this they did.

They remained in Ogden until the move south, which took place during the year 1858. My grandfather Cardon was engaged with the Utah Militia in the trouble with Johnson's army, and was stationed as a guard at the head of Echo Canyon to prevent the approach of this army. He was instructed to set fire to the homes and grain if it was found to be necessary.

In the year 1857 he married Susannah Gaudin, who had come from the same valley of the Piedmont, was related to him, and had walked across the plains in the first handcart company. It was the Edmund Ellsworth Company, which had arrived in Utah September 26, 1856, nearly two years after the Cardons had arrived. From this union six sons and five daughters were born. In December 1869, just 12 years later, he married Magdalene Beus, who was also from the same country and had come, as a child, in the same handcart company as his first wife. From this union nine children were born.

When Johnston's Army came, the saints were moved south and my grandmother, Susannah, accompanied them, carrying a small babe in her arms and walking much of the way. In the fall of 1859, Paul Cardon, his father, and a brother, Phillip, were called by President Brigham Young to go and help in the settlement of Cache Valley. Phillip later went to Mexico to help colonize, and another brother, Thomas, who had been in the army during the civil war, came to Cache Valley and there settled.

During the first spring in the valley they sowed over forty bushels of wheat, but reaped only seven bushels, due to the grasshoppers. There were only a few families in the valley at this time and the Cardons entered at once upon the activities necessary to protect themselves and neighbors against the then savage Indians, and to the work of building a new "Mormon settlement."

Paul Cardon assisted in erecting the first home in Logan, which was located on the block west of the old Lincoln Hotel. This was situated on the corner of First West and Center Street, where the Logan City school offices are now located. It was a home for a family by the name of Peacock.

He became actively engaged in defending the settlers against the many Indian raids that took place during the early settlement of Cache Valley, and risking his own life upon many occasions in defending others. He was almost constantly engaged in his work, neglecting his own personal affairs. This admirable quality characterized his entire life. He was very ambitious, quick, and full of energy. It was and has been said by those who knew him, that he didn't consider that he was doing his best until he could look behind himself and see his coattails flying. He was prominently identified with the religious, social, military, and civil organizations of the early history of Logan City and Cache Valley. As a member of the church, he placed himself and all he possessed at its service, for it was because of his great love for the work of the Lord that he and his people had left their native land. In a military capacity he held the rank of first Lt. of Cavalry, having received his commission from the President of the United States. As a local officer he served as first Treasurer of Logan City, and for many years acted as Marshall. He had charge of the Temple Mill in Logan Canyon, which furnished the lumber for the Logan Temple. He assisted in the surveying and building of the Logan canyon road, thus connecting the Bear Lake region with Logan. In all the affairs of the valley he was foremost among men.

The following is taken from an article edited by President W. M. Everton and printed in his page in the Herald Journal, dated June 2, 1934: "He [Paul Cardon] assisted in building the first house in Logan, which was made of logs. He and his family lived in a log house themselves for some time, and in about 1869 or 1870 he built the first adobe house of any size to be erected in Logan. This was a very pretentious building for those days, costing in the neighborhood of five thousand dollars. Here, for ten years, Paul Cardon ran a hotel called the Cache Valley House . . . He helped in the construction of both the Logan-Richmond and the Logan-Hyde Park Canals. In about 1865 he was called by Peter Maughan to go with Thomas E. Rich, Joseph Rich, and Josiah Ricks and begin construction of a road through the canyon to Bear Lake. He spent three or four

months each season for the next five years in this work. They followed an Indian trail up the left fork through Beaver and St. Charles Canyons, down to the settlement of St. Charles.

Prior to the building of the Temple Mill the scouts of the Coe and Carter outfit (railroad tie company) were annoyed at this invasion of their intended domain, but evidently determined to make this place (Temple Mill location) a base of operation in spite of priority claims. The local church officials, however, had their own scouts and when it was learned that Coe and Carter scouts had been inspecting Maughan's Fork they acted quickly to protect their interests. Paul Cardon was called, with George Batt and two or three other men to leave immediately for the canyon to commence construction of a saw mill in Maughan's Fork and to be on hand to prevent its occupation by the Coe and Carter outfit.

John P. Cardon (son of Paul) was about nine years old at the time, but he remembers his father coming home one afternoon in great haste and asking his mother to get food packed for him to take to the canyon. At the same time he told little Johnnie to hitch the mules to the wagon and fill the wagon box with hay and corn while he gathered the necessary tools and clothing. They left early in the evening and proceeded to their destination without delay. When the Coe and Carter outfit arrived, some forty-eight hours later, they found the first logs laid out for a big saw mill and men busily engaged in constructing shelters, etc., but not too busy to tell visitors that they intended to continue occupation of Maughan's Fork to the exclusion of any and all other outfits. It is thought that this event probably happened in 1876 or more likely in the spring or summer of 1877.

In 1880, Paul Cardon was called upon by the church authorities to build a large house which was to be used as a hotel and rooming house. This, they requested to be built, so that the many people who traveled here to work in the temple would have a decent and suitable place to stay. This building was located one-half block west of Main Street on First North, near where Dean C. Pack Motor company is now located. It was called the Cache Valley House. The Cardons continued to operate this business for about ten years, making friends with many people who came to Logan. He was instructed to make friends with the U.S. deputies who were in this part of the country trying to apprehend and punish polygamy offenders. There was a room especially constructed with very

thin partitions, next to the room where these deputies were roomed, and the family took turns listening through this wall. Many plans were revealed this way, and my father has said many times he went out the back door of a home after warning the Saints, just before the deputies came in the front. He said he took many a fast run or ride to the various homes of the Saints to give them warning.

When the deputies became suspicious of my grandfather, he left Logan and went into the northwest to help build railroads. He took the older part of his family with him to work, and left his wives and the younger children here to run the hotel. This proved too much for them and they later sold it.

The Herald Journal, many years ago, printed an article which reads in part: "To the Italian origin of Paul Cardon, Cache Valley owes its mulberry trees and its attempts at silk culture. Both he and his wife, Susannah, had become familiar with all branches of silk culture in their youth, and seeing the climatic similarity of Cache Valley and northern Italy, they determined to start the culture here. They imported mulberry seeds and silk worms from France and for a while it appeared that Utah might become a center of the silk industry." The trees grew well and some were still living a few years ago. I do not know of any at this time. Grandmother Cardon grew very proficient at this work. She reeled the first silk produced in Utah. She received many medals from all parts of the United States for the excellence of her work. She also taught this art to many other ladies of the church at the request of President Brigham Young.

Paul Cardon sang in the tabernacle choir for many years. My mother says she used to notice him there each Sunday when she was a child. She always admired him and called him "the pretty man", even before she knew his name or that he would one day be her father-in-law. He had a fair, pinkish complexion, and was always neat and well-dressed and pleasant. He took pride in his appearance and so did grandmother. She made him hand-tucked white shirts and always kept his clothes clean and neat. He loved people and wanted to be with them. He loved parties and fun and the social activities of the community. He was always a gentleman in every sense of the word.

My mother has told me that he liked her and her family and was very pleased when father married her. He always treated her with kindness, consideration and affection. He loved to help people and was generous to a fault. He had the gift of being able to make money, but would give it away as fast as he made it. He had a rather quick temper, but was soon over it and did not hold any grudges. He was a forceful and attractive man.

My grandmother was six years older than my grandfather and due to that and other reasons, she was not sure she should marry him. He persuaded her, however, and people who knew them have testified that they never had seen a more devoted couple than they were, even into old age. I have been told that he was always master in his home and that his wives and family always gave in to him and obeyed him. He always tried to do what was right and was a true and devoted husband and father all of his life. He ruled with love and understanding and sympathy.

I remember going to visit them, as a child, and I remember that both wives always lived in the same house, having separate apartments and furniture. [This conflicts with the information given in the history of Magdalene Beus, his second wife. Ed.] They seemed to love each other and never had any trouble or quarrels that I could learn of. We always went into "Aunty's side of the house" to visit when we went to see Grandpa, and their boat house on the Bear River was a source of pride and admiration to me.

In 1900 Paul returned to his native land as a missionary and also to try to get some of the genealogy of his people. At this time he was 61 years old. Quoting from Elder Daniel B. Hill Richards, in his book, "The Scriptural Allegory:" "While still laboring as a missionary at Neuchatel, Switzerland, in the winter of 1900, Daniel B. Richards received an appointment from Platte D. Lyman, president of the European Mission at Liverpool and from Louis S. Cardon (my father) who was president of the Swiss and Italian Missions, to go into Italy and see what could be done in re-opening the Italian Mission and establishing a branch of the church there. April 26, 1900 I met Elder Paul Cardon of Cache County, Utah at the railroad station in Turin. He has come to this part of Italy to assist me in this part of the vineyard and also to look up his genealogy. Not a great distance from here was the home of his ancestors."

"Elder Cardon located a lone woman over 80 years of age, who had once known him. We visited this woman in her cottage high on the top of the mountains, and conversed with her. She had forgotten her early faith and was now ashamed of the gospel of Christ."

My father has told us that while Grandfather Cardon was laboring in Italy on his mission, he was moved by the poverty and great need of these people, and father had to practically take his purse away from him as he wanted to give more than he had to them. Only a few of these people ever joined the church.

In 1892 Paul and some of his younger family moved to Benson, where he bought a large farm. He became a member of the bishopric and was loved and honored by the good people of that area. They lived there until 1912 (ten years) and then, desiring to spend their remaining years among their children, and also to do the temple work for their kindred dead, they moved back to Logan. They located in the Logan Seventh Ward and lived there until the time of his death. Paul was the father of twenty children, and his posterity number into the hundreds. He died February 12, 1915, after a lingering illness. He had some type of stomach trouble which had afflicted him for some months previous to his death. It is generally supposed to have been cancer, in this more enlightened age.

A clipping from the Logan Republican dated February 16, 1915 says, in part: "In the passing of Paul Cardon another of the old faithful pioneers goes to his well-earned rest and leaves, in his large posterity, and multitudes of friends, the richest legacy that can come to any mortal. He is the last member of the second generation of Cardons to pass to the great beyond. Of him it can truthfully be said, 'He was one of God's noble men, an honest man . . . devoted to god works.' He had his funeral in the old Seventh Ward chapel, and he is buried in the Logan City Cemetery.

Hyrum Michael Cardon

I was born August 16, 1873, in Logan Utah, in an old house about midway on the north side of first north and first west. It was just about where Blair's garage stood. Doctors were not available in those days, so Sister Burgess, a midwife of Hyde Park, Utah assisted. The fee was two bushels of wheat. I was the second son of the family; the oldest boy, James, got some lye and died in infancy.

I attended school in Logan in a one-room log house that stood on the west side of the road midway between First and Second North.

I attended another school about midway between Center and First West Streets on the south side of the road, and another school which stood on the north side of the street on Second North between Main Street and First West about one third of the way down. When I was fourteen years old, my father decided that I had had enough education and took me out of school and I went to work on the railroad in Washington and Oregon.

I remember when I was in Washington a big fire burned 38 blocks in the business district. We usually worked until the latter part of November. Then we would come home and I would be permitted to go to school again until time to go to work in the spring. I never lived much with my mother, but spent most of my time with father and aunty.

In 1893, when Cox's army rampaged the country, I ran away from home. My brother Mose and I were plowing and we broke the plow. We didn't dare face father, so we left home. I worked a year or so in Pocatello, then I went to Omaha. From there, I went up into the Dakotas and worked around Fargo.

Early the next year I landed in Butte, Montana and worked in a coal yard. That was the year a big explosion occurred. A carload of giant powder exploded, and the building we

were in was blown to pieces. From Butte, I went to Pocatello, then to Piedmont, Wyoming, where I worked on a cattle ranch. After that, I worked on a bridge gang between Pocatello and Butte, where we repaired brigdes.

In 1902, I returned to the farm in Benson and worked for father again. After some of the farms were cultivated, a bridge was built over Logan and Bear River. About 1905, Louis and Joseph had rented the old W. B. Preston place on Bear River and Louis wanted me to work with them.

In 1909 I was called on a mission to the Western States, with headquarters at Denver, Colorado. I was married April 8, 1909, and I left for my mission on April 13, 1909. President John L.

Herrick was the president of the mission. I was in Denver three or four months when I was transferred to Omaha, where I worked for about a year. I was then sent to the Dakotas, where I was made president of the branch. We worked around Leeds and Dead Wood. There were eight elders there, and we spent the winter in Hot Springs.

The next year my wife planned to come out, so I was permitted to finish my mission in Omaha, where we could both work. When my wife got there, President Herrick said he was sorry he hadn't had her come out sooner. My mission lasted 32 months. We arrived home in November of 1911 and went to live in the home of the W. B. Preston farm. We didn't stay there long; Louis and Joe wanted to go down to Rush Valley to homestead. I went and Mother (his wife) stayed home with her folks. She didn't favor the Rush Valley proposition.

In the spring, I bought eighty acres of dry farm across Logan River, that had belonged to Johnny. After two years of farming this I became discouraged and sold out to William Baugh and went up to Idaho to look for a farm. I bought a big dry farm up at Canyon Creek, Idaho. I moved mother up there in September, and she left in November. She said it was no place to raise a family. Farmers had been living there for 25 years and were still living in one-room dirt-roofed log houses and there were no schools, so mother couldn't see any future there. I sold this farm and went back to Benson where my father-in-law sold us some land. Fifty acres of it was bottom land, and the Utah Power and Light bought all the river bottom land, so that took most of our acreage. Then we bought forty acres of the old W. B. Preston farm for \$300 per acre. In 1918 we rented our farm to the Japs and that year we had 900 ton of beets at \$10 a ton. The Japs received one third of it.

Later we bought some pasture land near Logan; but, when the city decided to build an airport they confiscated our pasture, so we had to find another. We bought out in the Logan Highland Pasture. In 1949 we bought the Silas Ricks place as a cost of \$14,000.

We have sent two sons on missions; two sons-in-law have gone on missions, and on my eighty-first birthday, all the family was present, which consists of six children, six in-laws and 27 grandchildren. Every Christmas we have strived to have all the family come home.

Isabelle Roundy

I was born 25 October 1882, at Kanarra, Utah. Later in life, when I was 22 I visited this little town and saw the house where I was born and where my father and grandfather had served as bishops. The wife of a bishop in those days was much different than those of today. It was mother's duty to entertain and care for the presiding officers of the church as they made their journeys from Salt Lake to St. George, so we children became familiar with the names, lives, and duties of the presiding officers of the church.

When I was about one and one-half years old, we moved to Snowflake, Arizona, where the saints were trying to live the united order. My father was never very robust in health, and for that reason our stay in Arizona was of short duration. From Snowflake, we moved to Escalante, Garfield County, Utah, a town nestled down in the mountains and almost isolated from the rest of the state. My memories of this place were all quite

pleasant ones, with only two or three exceptions. On May 23, 1886, my younger sister died after we had lived there about one year. She and I had been riding with my father part way to the field. When we returned to the house, she wandered around to an old surface well and fell in. I remember very distinctly the preparations for the funeral.

Another dark period was during the polygamy raids. I remember how careful and alert we had to be. At one time, the deputies, as we called them, pulled a gun on my older brother, but mother told them to put up their gun and she would see that he returned. It was the boast of the officers that they would capture my father. In order to reach Escalante, it was necessary to cross a high mountain, and when the U.S. Marshalls entered town, it was generally known a short time before they reached there. And what a time we all had to keep father's whereabouts a secret. Our house was situated on a corner lot, and at meal time we children would be stationed at different points to keep a lookout, while father ate; and every morning my brother would go all through he hay in the barn to see if any one of them could be concealed there. At one time they came to the house very unexpectedly and we knew father was in the barn. While they conversed with my mother, my

oldest sister, Olive (who was a cripple) crawled from the bedroom window and crawled on her hands and knees to the barn, a distance of 35 rods, to warn father and he escaped. Then I remember how they dragged my mother, oldest sister (who they thought was father's second wife) and brother over to Beaver, a distance of 125 miles, to appear in court in the dead of winter, but they never caught father.

My father was a fruit fancier here, and we children delighted to follow him around the orchard and help with his budding and grafting. He used to have plums and peaches growing on the same tree. My mother's brother, Wesley Young, helped father care for the sheep which left father more time to spend with his fruit grafting and pruning.

When I was ten years old, my mother and older sisters went to Salt Lake and I was left home to take care of the younger children. I remember how important I felt when I could invite company to Sunday dinner and play the hostess. In the spring we used to go to school barefoot. I remember being the champion speller in school.

Another dark period in our life in Escalante was the burning down of a huge barn my father had built. It and all the contents were completely destroyed. There was very little water there, and I remember the fire smoldered for nearly a week. Perhaps it was a blessing in disguise, because my father decided to move again. The barn was the largest one in town, ninety feet long, and forty feet wide. It was built of logs and lined with boards. It was in the fall of the year when this happened and the barn was filled with hay and machinery, and great stacks of straw were on the outside. Two little boys playing with matches set it on fire. The fire, along with other things, influenced father to make another move. His children were now getting old enough to be thinking about better schools, and he decided that Escalante was too far from good schools. So in 1894 he started out in search of a better environment. He took his second wife, Esther Ford Roundy, and left my mother in Escalante. After much looking around, he settled in Benson and wrote to my mother to dispose of the property in Escalante and join them there. We left in the spring of 1895. I was twelve years old.

We left May 16, in two covered wagons. It was a delightful trip for the children. We would always look for a cool, green, shady place to camp, and as soon as camp was made, a fire would be built. We would cook supper and then sleep out under the stars. I would like to be that young again and enjoy those simple pleasures as much as I did then. We reached Benson on May 27, traveling over 300 miles. During the journey, two of the children had scarletina and the last day of the trip it snowed all day.

The first summer in Benson wasn't too pleasant. It was quite a contrast to what we had been used to. We had lived in a small town with neighbors just across the street in every direction. Both mother and Aunt Ester had large homes, and here, for that first summer, the two families consisting of two women and thirteen children lived in four rooms and a shanty. We were not used to mosquitoes, and we surely suffered from them that first summer. We used to have what we called midnight parades, when we would arise, take our pillows, and kill what mosquitoes we could, and then try to get a little more sleep.

My father was a very industrious man, and by the following January he had erected a fine brick house, consisting of ten rooms, for my mother. When the basement was dug, the ground was so hard, I was elected to ride the beam of the plow while they plowed it. In two more years, he built a similar one for Aunt Ester. Then that was followed by a big barn and other buildings. He was a pioneer in dry farming and a very public spirited man. It was through his efforts that the railroad went through Benson and he was of much assistance in erecting a schoolhouse and a meeting house in the ward.

Father tried to give all his children a good education, and he was a very well educated man, although he attended school very little. He was a faithful Latter-day Saint and lived his religion as thoroughly as any man I knew. He always paid an honest tithing and donated liberally to every undertaking for the upbuilding of his community and church.

In 1900, my sister, Susie, died and in 1903 my brothers passed away within six weeks of each other. This was a terrible blow to my parents.

When I was 15 years old, I was called to teach in the Sunday School and I acted as teacher and secretary for 15 years. Later I taught occasionally between births of my children.

In 1901 I was called to act as first counselor in the Mutual, and in 1903 I was called to be president, which I was until 1915.

Since then I have taught a class under every MIA president until I was called to be president in 1936 and then I again acted as adult and special-interest class leader until I was chosen to work in East Cache Stake Relief Society board as Educational Counselor from then. I was again a teacher from 1935 to 1947. Then again in 1956. I was Educational Counselor in the East Cache stake Relief Society and held that position from 1947 to 1955. In 1919 I was called to be the literary teacher in the Relief Society and held that position until 1936, when I was called to be president. I have taught the literary lesson for 28 years. I also taught three years in the religion class and one year in primary.

I graduated from BYU in 1902 and taught school for eight years: one year in Randolph, Utah; four years in Benson; one year in Hyrum, Utah; and two years at Franklin, Idaho. I held a state teacher's certificate for both Utah and Idaho. The state superintendent of Idaho said he thought it was a crime for me to get married; I should spend my life teaching school.

I was married to Hyrum Michael Cardon 8 April 1909 in the Salt Lake Temple and served a short term mission in the Western States in 1911.

I am the mother of seven children. One of my seven children has preceded me to the great beyond; and, like Cornelia of old, I can say my children are my jewels. My greatest joy and pleasure is my family. All my living children have been married in the temple, which is the greatest accomplishment of all. I have been able to take care of the mothers and families at the time of the births of all the grandchildren but two.

I have served as secretary and treasurer of the Benson Bear Lake Irrigation Company for 36 years and was clerk for my father in the Benson Irrigation Company for four years.

My children are: Margaret, a graduate of USAC, married to Russell R. Rich, director of the department of Church History at BYU; Doyle, graduated from USAC and spend 34 months in the French mission, and is now Junior Technologist in the Bureau of Reclamation, married to Lucille Dunn; Neva, a graduate of USAC, married to Lorin J. Hawkes, X-ray technician for Westinghouse; Nada, graduate of North Cache High School, married to Grant Stevenson, working for Utah Power and Light; Kenneth, graduate of North Cache, bishop of Benson, married to Alice Simmons; Wayne, graduate of North Cache, served a mission to Uruguay and married to Sharlene Fullmer.

GEORGE DAVID CARDON, ELIZABETH HULDAH BALLANTYNE AND ETHEL GUILD HASLINGER

George David Cardon

George David Cardon was the fourth child of John Paul Cardon and Magdalene Beus. He was born in Logan on October 1, 1877, in the large adobe house his father had built for the family about 1870 -- incidentally, the first adobe house built in Cache Valley. This was the year Paul Cardon and Company worked on the construction of the Temple Mill (started on May 11, 1877, just six days before the site of the temple was dedicated) -- which was to furnish the lumber for the building of the Logan Temple.

A little over two years later, when George was only two and one-half years old, Paul opened the Cache Valley House to the public. He had been delegated by Brigham Young to build this, the first hotel in the valley, for the convenience of travelers and of those who were to work on temple construction. Paul, with the help of his two wives and many children, operated this establishment for the next eight years. It was in this environment, therefore, that George spent his childhood, mingling with the new settlers, travellers, church officials, trappers, temple builders, Washaki Indians -- the whole array of the frontier procession. As he grew older he helped with chores at home and at the hotel, went to school, played kick-the-can, went fishing, attended Sunday School, and helped his father quarry stone at Temple Cave.

After several years, the U. S. deputy marshalls were sent to Logan in an attempt to curtail polygamy and punish its practioners. Paul Cardon was asked to become an ex-officio agent and report the plans of the deputies, but after a time he came under suspicion, himself, so Magdalene and her family were packed off to the settlement of Richmond, a few miles north, while he, with four of his children, went to Spokane, Washington, where he obtained a small contract to do work on the Northern

Pacific Railroad, then under construction.

During the two-year period while Paul Cardon was in the Northwest, George -- now ten or eleven (and the "man" of the family, since his elder brother, Hyrum, age 15, had accompanied his father) -- helped as best he could in the efforts of the "second" family to survive. His mother made the living by sewing and doing whatever else she could find in an effort to make ends meet. Aunt Mary Merrill, the eldest daughter of her husband, was married and also lived in Richmond, and she helped the family by providing milk, in exchange for sewing, and whatever else she could spare to help out. The two youngest girls, Violet and Katie, were born during the period the family lived in Richmond.

When John Paul returned in 1890 he decided to sell the Cache Valley House and buy a farm for his two large families -- rapidly reaching its ultimate total of twenty children. He purchased three quarter-sections of railroad land in Benson Ward at \$1.25 an acre, built a large brick house and barn, and eventually moved both families in.

George didn't like farming, though he did his share along with all the others, who were kept at

work, summer and winter, except during school hours. He attended school every chance he got, and finally, on September 2, 1899, he obtained his teacher's certificate at Brigham Young College in Logan, which qualified him to teach grammar school. He was now almost 22 years old.

He taught school for a period of about five years: at Paradise, Wellsville, Benson Ward, and College Ward (all in Cache Valley) and one year at Lyman, near Fort Bridger.

During this period he met and courted Elizabeth Ballantyne, whose family was engaged in dry farming at Cache Junction, not far from Benson Ward. They were married on September 10, 1902.

George moved his bride into a house next to the old Eccles residence in Logan. He taught school until 1905, when he entered the employ of the Cardon Realty Company, established by his two brothers, Joseph and Louis.

George and Elizabeth lost their first two children, both sons. After Ardell was born, they moved to a frame house in the Logan Seventh Ward, and later to a large brick house, which was remodeled from an old school structure, at 496 East First South street, which was set on several acres of ground. In the meantime, Paul Cardon had sold his Benson Ward farm and moved into the property adjoining.

George and Lizzie lived here from about 1912 to 1923, when, because of business losses and bankruptcy of the business, George moved the family to Ogden, and established an abstract business there.

During the years in Logan, George Cardon was active in church and community affairs. He helped start some of the first Community Chest and P. T. A. groups and was president of both at various times. He helped promote many recreational and church activities and was on the committee that located the sites of the MIA camps in Logan Canyon. He was active in Boy Scouts and Sunday School classes, giving both time and money to both.

As he started anew in Ogden, his family numbered seven children -- Ardell, Carlos, Winona,

Beth, Marie, Dean, and Dorothy, the latter only four months old. The early years in the new town were very difficult, and he no longer found the time or energy for the community activities he had enjoyed in Logan.

Katie, his youngest siter, moved with him to Ogden to assist in the business, as she had done in Logan. She and their mother, Magdalene, lived in a house on Kershaw Street, while George moved his family into a two-bedroom bungalow -- a big change from the large house in Logan.

The business increased very slowly, and the children, at various periods, helped with the typing and other work in the office. A very earnest effort was made to keep the children in school and give them some college training. Winona and Beth were the only two who completed a four-year college course, graduating from the Utah State Agricultural College in Logan. The other five had varying amounts of college work. Ardell and Dorothy both graduated from Weber Junior College.

In the forties, George and his youngest son, Dean, who was in the business with him, purchased a commercial lot and built a small office building, which housed the abstract firm and two other companies, and for the first time, his financial lot was easier. The family had finally settled in a spacious, well-built home at 2547 Van Buren Ave., in 1936.

George's family had more than its share of illnesses and hospital bills, but perhaps the most difficult trial of all was the unexpected death of the eldest son, Carlos, on 14 April 1942. George Cardon never really recovered from the shock of this bereavement. The death of his wife, Elizabeth, followed ten years later, in June, 1952.

On May 19, 1954, after only a few weeks acquaintance, he married his second cousin, Ethel Guild Haslinger. Four weeks and four days later, he was killed in an accidental fall from a ladder. He was buried next to his wife and son at the Altorest Memorial Park in Ogden.

Amanda Cardon

My life started when I was born in the year 1880. I don't know who the doctor or midwife was, but my father and mother were there to greet me. As far back as I can remember was when I was about five years old. I would play with my two brothers who were a year or so younger than I and as I grew a little older I would run away from my mother, who was always busy. My mother was always busy in the kitchen cooking, washing, and ironing and sewing for all the the family, including my father's first wife's family. Auntie, as we always called her, made the beds and swept each room after the tourists left. I guess they were either tourists or people traveling through the country hunting different places to live. (My father built a large house, it had twenty-two rooms in it and it was the first hotel at Logan. He called it the Cache Valley House.) I guess that is why I used to run away, and for punishment I would have to be tied up to the bed post and rock my baby brother to sleep. I would sing some kind of a song to him, but the more I would sing the louder he would cry, until he would give out and go to sleep. Sometimes I would have to go without my supper.

There was a lobby upstairs in this hotel and it had a beautiful organ installed there and I would hear some of the people playing on it and when they were gone I would slip up there and try to play the tunes I would hear them play. I finally got so I could play a few tunes with one hand and after I was old enough to go to Sunday School I would come home and play a few of the songs I heard in there with just one hand.

I hated school. My mother would have to take me every day until I was old enough to realize it was for my benefit. I got tied to the teacher's apron strings more than once for doing something I shouldn't have done, like not getting my lessons or drawing an ugly picture of my teacher on my slate and showing it to the rest of the kids. They would laugh and disturb the classes. I was really a mischievous kid. I guess I was, all the way from eight years old until I moved to Richmond. My teachers there were Herschel Bullen, Samuel Hendricks and someone by the name of Thompson. The teacher I liked best was Mr. Bullen. He was jolly and full of jokes and so were his students, so we all got along good together. I wasn't the smartest student he had in his school, but I always got my lessons with the help of my mother, even though she never had much of an education. She had plenty of patience.

While living at Richmond she did a lot of sewing and making suits and dresses to help out with the living expenses and a beautiful seamstress she was. I used to sit up at night with her and pull the basting threads out as she always basted her dresses and suits up before she sewed them up on the machine. I believe she must have sewed for about everyone in Richmond and I think that was how I learned to sew as good as I did.

We moved to Benson Ward and that is where I spent my happiest days. My father built quite a large house, large enough for his two families, and they got along very well. Whenever we had company, no matter who it was, they would open up the folding doors between the two kitchens

and set a big long table and all eat together. We always had plenty of the common food such as vegetables, pork and fish. We lived right by the Logan River and my dad would catch some of the big trout that were in the river. We always had plenty of hams and shoulder pork besides the good old bacon. We never did have to buy any vegetables, as my dad raised everything, even some of the best celery. We had an old boat, and our friends would come to our place and we would go boat riding on the Logan River just about every Sunday afternoon, or else buggy riding and horse back riding. That is all the recreation we really had besides going to church, and that we always did. Everyone went to church in those days.

We were just like one big family. I had several boy friends that always came to see me, and two or three of them were my husband's brothers. They were all pretty good fellows, but I liked Silas the best, as he was always good to his mother and helped her in lots of different ways, so I decided if he asked me to marry him I would. There was a little matter of asking my father if he could marry me, as we all had to respect him in that, so he came one Sunday and decided he would ask him and I stood outside the door and listened to the conversation and I thought he was never going to ask him, but he finally did. We celebrated our 50th wedding anniversary the year before he died.

Silas Sanford Ricks

My father was born 9 July 1877. He was the son of William Ricks and Margaret Gordon. He was born and raised in Benson, Utah, where he lived throughout his life. He was mostly interested in cattle buying and selling, which took him away from home much of the time. He enjoyed traveling and in the early part of his life he traveled by horse. I have heard him tell many stories about his travels by horse back. He always had a dog with him wherever he went in those days. About the first memories that I have of my father was when I was four or five years old. Sometimes he would be gone for one or two months and when he called my mother on the phone and told her he was coming home us kids would walk about a half mile to sit on the side of the road to wait for them to come. He always came on a horse and he would put as many as he could on the horse and let us ride back home. When we got home we would brush his hair and take off his shoes and stockings and sit on his lap. It was always quite an occasion when he came home.

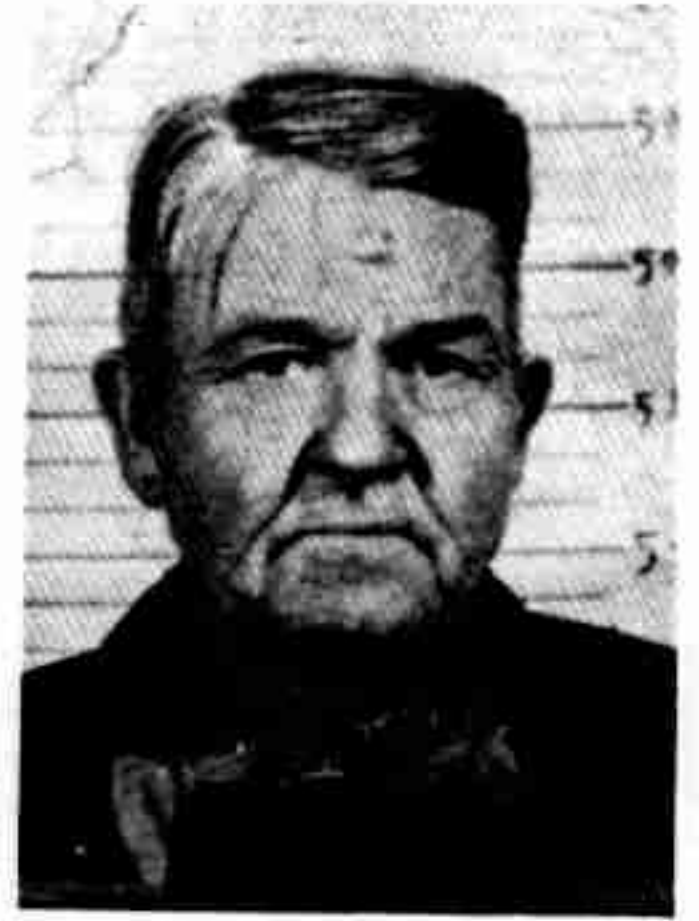
We were a large family -- nine boys and four girls -- so he had quite a job before him to make a living for so many. Lots of times we didn't have all the things we needed.

My father's father gave each one of his children a tract of land, and then he went over to the Clarkston, Utah hills and homesteaded another large tract of land for cattle to graze on. He also went into the sheep business with some of his brothers. So for about ten or fifteen years he tended sheep over in the ranch; sometimes in the summer we would leave our home in Benson, Utah and spend most of the summer months there, which we enjoyed very much.

My father was a good man: he didn't smoke or drink, but he didn't attend church very much. I

pictures of his sons in his purse so he could show them off to people.

My father met my mother and he told this story to my brother Claude. One day he and some of his friends and some of his brothers were sitting on the fence by the side the road and my mother came along the road and my father said to the others, "There's a pretty girl. I am going to marry her someday." It wasn't long until he was taking her to church and out to dances. They went together for a year or more and were married 19 December 1901 in the Logan L.D.S. Temple. They built the family home about two years after their marriage and lived there most of their lives. My father had good health until the last six or seven years of his life, and then he got sick and had a lot of trouble being in and out of hospitals many times. He suffered with heart trouble and dropsey, bleeding ulcers and had a gland operation which was very hard on his nerves and at the last he got so bad with his nerves that he had to be treated in a mental hospital, where he died 1 February 1950. He also had high blood pressure and suffered several slight strokes in his brain and throat and finally the last stroke paralyzed his left side, which was the cause of his death. His funeral was held in the Benson Ward Chapel and he is buried in the Logan City Cemetery.
